

# #1 A call for 2005 to be a year of serious action by Guyanese at home and abroad

I returned to St. Lucia on January 3, after eleven wonderful days in Georgetown, Guyana. I am very thankful for the experience and I felt the pain and the joy of my fellow Guyanese as we weathered the difficulties brought about by the floods. Very few people who lived in Georgetown escaped putting their feet into the muddy water during the heavy rains. However, Georgetown with all its problems is still a great city to visit and for me being home for the holidays was one of the best gifts I could have given myself.

The Garden City was under water for Christmas and New Year. Everything to spoil the season happened. On Boxing Day morning, many homes were flooded. Many reasons were advanced for the flooding, a Commission was set up but the spirit of the people remained high and, in the end, a peaceful and joyful Season was achieved. The parties were grand and the fun was very much the way it used to be. The oldies were goldies everywhere coming from the sound systems. In spite of the rainy nights, hearts were warm and the good times rolled.

Many of us who traveled to Guyana during the run up to Christmas were left without luggage for several days. A group of us went home for a wedding of a colleague and got our luggage just hours before the ceremony. There was even a strike at the airport which caused some passengers to miss some of the fun. The Murphy Law did prove itself. Everything that could have gone wrong, did.

Those of us who experienced the bad weather and flooding must be grateful that no death was recorded. Many business places suffered substantial loss in damaged products and patronage as a result. Good old Fogarty's was as old times untouched by the flood. I had breakfast in the Snackette and did some shopping in the Department store. I truly enjoyed the atmosphere as it brought back memories of my younger days.

The time has come for business owners in the city to take over its upkeep with the support of the City Council and the Government and put in place those necessary things to return Georgetown to its former glory. We can surely do better. Something is definitely wrong and steps must be taken to correct the state of affairs. If something is not done to correct the flooding of the city, given our unfortunate state of being under sea level, we can well experience a Tsunami in Guyana. Our Capital is too beautiful to allow such decay.

The weather pattern of the world has changed drastically. In the Caribbean what used to be rainy season is now dry and natural disasters everywhere are increasing in intensity and devastation. The signal is clear that national governments have to step in and ensure that drainage takes priority as to neglect this important undertaking can be costly to a nation.

Elections are in the air in Guyana and St. Lucia, although constitutionally due in 2006, political parties are assembling in both countries. Many are convinced that the results in both countries are predictable as potential new entrants into the field of politics are not prepared to take risks and to fail is almost suicidal.

Some interesting things are happening in Guyana. The road to Timehri will be completed in 2005; already the trip is easier than it used to be. Housing schemes are coming on stream and generally the prospects look good for 2005 and beyond. Guyana will be an attractive destination for Caribbean people when the 1st phase of the CSME is implemented later this year. We will see a number of our CARICOM brothers and sisters owning property in Guyana because it will be very attractive to them given their high currency. Regional tourists travelling to Guyana will be substantially increased. Business will boom as already many consumer products are competitively priced.

Guyanese business persons, small, medium and large are collaborating with the Government to promote Guyanese products around the Caribbean and beyond. This year they are commencing their road show with a Trade Exhibition to St. Lucia scheduled to take place February 25 – 27, 2005. Honorary Consul for Guyana to St. Lucia Mr. Lokesh Singh is leaving no stone unturned to ensure that the Mission is a success. The Guyana – St. Lucia Association is collaborating fully and it fits in beautifully with the Annual Awards Ceremony that is held to mark Republic Anniversary celebrations. So come February 22, we celebrate, St. Lucia's Anniversary of Independence and move into Guyana's Republic Anniversary, followed by the Trade Exhibition.

Let us take action from wherever we are whether at home in Guyana or abroad that we lift up the banner of Guyana high and support our friends and families are holding the fort that we can return from time to time to a place we can call home.

If you have not been home for a while, resolve to visit sometime this year and catch up on what could be an eye opener to the developments that have taken place in our dear land – Guyana. I congratulate those who have stayed on and continue to contribute to the progress that is taking place.

Let us look forward with optimism to a Bright and Prosperous 2005. Keep the Faith, God is in Charge!

#### #2 Support for Guyana

The Guyana St. Lucia Association is joining with other Guyanese and their Organizations around the world to lend support to our brothers and sisters who have suffered the worst floods in several decades.

Many religious persons will say it is the warning of God upon the nation of Guyana. However, Guyana is experiencing the effects of changing times as it relates to weather patterns. The weather is unpredictable these days and even when the meteorologists predict a hurricane or storm path in many cases, they change course as was in the case of Ivan in Grenada. Here in St. Lucia we just cannot understand what is happening as the weather is unpredictable. There is no sunny or rainy period, we just have to make do with whatever the day brings.

The situation in Guyana calls for a serious look at the way planning for our country's development is done. It is time for a shift of the capital and less concentration of future expansion on the coast line. It has now been demonstrated that we are vulnerable to flooding and it is very likely that substantial deaths could result in future disasters. Where do we go from here?

It is necessary that we begin at the source of our problem which is political. We need a political solution for our nation. It was the promise of the PPP-Civic when they entered office to revisit the constitution of Guyana. The core aspects are yet to be dealt with. President Burnham and his team when the constitution was drafted sought to perpetuate themselves in office. It was the work of genius and when the current administration reviewed the issue of elections, they turned a blind eye and will now enjoy the rights and privileges that will keep them in office until we who are alive today are long gone.

President Jagdeo has a unique opportunity to leave a legacy that sets Guyana free once and for all. We must return to first past the post and establish true representation for our people throughout the land. There must be a political solution and we must be selfless about it. Where there is no vision the people perish. When we fail to change a system that is against the people of a nation that is the highest form of deception and God will not bless such a nation. Elections must be free and fair and free from fear. There is much to be done for the people of Guyana if we are to return to prosperity. We must do what is right at all cost.

In 1997 I got into to politics with the hope that given the method of voting with photo ID that we would have seen a hung parliament and democracy if allowed would have flourished. We cannot but help recognizing the problem we have in Guyana is as a direct result of interference of the British in our politics and the Burnham administration which caused proportional representation to be introduced in the first place and the subsequent introduction of the current constitution. The PPP-Civic inherited a good thing. In the interest of the people, they need to take action to end this intolerable state of affairs.

In St. Lucia, the Guyana St. Lucia Association in collaboration with the Honorary Consul, Mr. Lokesh Singh has launched a Guyana Flood Relief Fund and established an account with the Bank of St. Lucia, main branch which could be accessed from any branch around the island. The account number is 901101 912. Mr. Ronald Ramjattan, Managing Director of Baron Foods Ltd., with the assistance of Cagema, a Shipping Company and the contributions of individuals – Guyanese and friends will be shipping a 40ft container load of supplies to Guyana shortly.

The Honorary Consul for Guyana to St. Lucia, Mr. Lokesh Singh has been busy with the media promoting the Guyana Flood Relief Fund. So far, the response has been heartening.

Looking beyond the flood, Guyana needs us, and whatever the challenges, it will take committed persons at home and abroad to bring about the changes that are necessary. I am firmly convinced that change must come. It must not be allowed to be business as usual. We cannot but conclude that there has been a high degree of neglect in our country. It is time to fix it once and for all. The Carter Foundation has got to do more. Maybe, it is time to invite President Bill Clinton to help us to instill some reasonableness into the hearts of our politicians. Let us do anything that will help us to return Guyana to true Democracy. I can imagine that some will say I am inviting foreigners in our national affairs, but it was President Carter who persuaded the PNC to be reasonable and let the chips fall, and it was he who called the exit poll for a PPP-Civic to claim victory. Let him now help to correct what is wrong, and many things are really wrong.

Just don't only keep the faith, do something!!! God is in charge!!!

#### #3 St. Lucia reaches out to Guyana's flood victims!!!

The Government of Saint Lucia, its citizens and Guyanese resident in St. Lucia have all reached out to Guyanese people in their time of need. A Guyana Flood Relief Fund bank account was established at the Main Branch of the Bank of St. Lucia in Castries with access to the public at all branches around the island. The initiative was launched on Friday, January 28, 2005 by the Guyana St. Lucia Association with the full support of the Honorary Consul for Guyana to Saint Lucia, Mr. Lokesh Singh. In just a few days, members of the Association and well-wishers came forward with offers of assistance. Mr. Ronald Ramjattan, Managing Director of Baron Foods Ltd. was instrumental in getting Cagema Shipping to donate a 40ft container to ship donations of products collected from government agencies, schools, businesses and individuals. He also made his offices available in the North and South of the island as collection points and provided transportation and warehousing for the supplies which were finally loaded on the container from his facility on Friday, February 11, 2005.

The push came when the Prime Minister of Saint Lucia, Honorable Dr. Kenny D. Anthony on his return from an overseas trip where he met with the St. Lucian citizens resident in Cayenne, convened a meeting with the Honorary Consul for Guyana to Saint Lucia, Mr. Lokesh Singh and Members of the Executive Board of the Guyana St. Lucia Association. The meeting was held on Thursday, February 3, 2005 in the Cabinet meeting room in the office of the Prime Minister where members of his delegation included the Ambassador to CARICOM, His Excellency Anthony Severin, Miss Dawn French, Director of the National Emergency Management Office (NEMO) and Officials of the Ministry of Health.

The Prime Minister requested that NEMO get involved immediately and put into operation its disaster mobilization plans, and get off to Guyana a supply of drugs by airfreight by the following Monday, while other supplies would be forwarded by ocean freight. NEMO's Director promised to take immediate action to get out media releases and request the Post Offices around the island to act as collection points. The meeting brought into effect a collaborative effort between the Guyana St. Lucia Association and the National Emergency Management Office. The Vice President of the Association, Mr. Doodnauth Shivnauth coordinated the Flood Relief Project and was responsible for putting together the shipment of Drugs in time to meet the deadline as directed by the Prime Minister. Cabinet will meet shortly to decide on further assistance to the citizens of Guyana. NEMO provided direct assistance in the supply of essential commodities also involved the assistance of the Red Cross as a collection point in Castries.

Offer of assistance has come from neighboring Martinique and it is possible that many persons would be calling after Friday with assistance. A decision would have to be taken to deal with the spillover of assistance. In the meantime, the Guyana Flood Relief Fund will be open for cash donations until the 23rd of February, 2005. It is expected the amount raised will be handed over to a Representative of the Government of the Republic of Guyana at the Annual Awards Ceremony of the Association which is scheduled for Thursday the 24th of February, 2005 at the Dame Pearlette Louisy Primary School at 6.00pm

The flooding in recent weeks in Guyana has caused untold sufferings and has been rightfully qualified as a national disaster. The international aid donors have stepped up with substantial assistance. The UN is now on the ground and as a result the world is fully behind Guyana and its peoples. The citizens who reside on the coast line and river banks of the low-lying areas can no longer feel safe. Serious consideration needs to be given to the Conservancy Dam as it has been proven that we can no longer only consider the Atlantic Ocean to be a threat but we are now faced with the reality of the Conservancy Dam as well.

Guyanese living outside of Guyana – around the world rallied to their families and citizens in general. Money transfers, barrels, containers of supplies were all dispatched and continue to be dispatched in an effort to ease the situation. It is said that the Lord helps those who help themselves and the Guyanese Diaspora has risen to the occasion and because of our interest in ensuring we do as much as we can for our countrymen and women, the world is rallying around us.

There have been reports of illnesses, diseases and deaths as a result of the flooding and the water remaining in certain areas for weeks which has only made things worse. Our neighbours and friends have made and continue to make substantial contributions in an effort to return things to normalcy while taking care of those who are suffering. Brazil and Cuba stand out. Their response was swift and effective. It is hoped that the leptospirosis disease will be controlled and the causes eliminated in the shortest possible time so that loss of lives could be minimized.

It has been a difficult time for all Guyanese whether at home or abroad. Many had to live with the grief of the loss of loved ones and had to wait a long time before committing them to their final resting place. To imagine the situation brings tears to one's eyes, much more to live through the experience.

In times like these regardless of however we feel about the way things are going in the country, it gives us an opportunity to reflect upon the fundamental issues that redound to the very existence of our people. In my last article I received a lot of positive feedback and a few not so kind remarks but it is the price you pay for doing what many other persons will not. It is the timeliness of what is said that will make a difference. A call for unity among the races at this time is paramount as we must come together to win the war against disease and poverty which will evidently be inflicted upon the Guyanese people as a result of this disaster. Given the response of Guyanese living abroad, it is very clear to me that regardless of wherever citizens of a country reside, they are inextricably linked to their homeland. Those of us whose families are affected by this disaster would of necessity have to dig deeper into our pockets to provide support to them for many months to come.

In spite of the fact that the disaster has been substantial and the effects will linger for a long time, we have lots to be thankful for as the situation could have been much more disastrous. Thousands of lives could have been lost based the level of the flood waters. It is time for Thanksgiving now that the water has receded. Let us give God thanks for spared lives and for friends around the world who have supported in one way or another in the time of need. Most of all let us pray for unity and goodwill among the peoples of Guyana. May God continue to guide the leaders and peoples of the nation of the Republic of Guyana and make their burdens light.

The President's Address to the nation highlighted the call to rebuild, now that the water receded fully. The world is behind Guyana and it is evident that things will be back to normalcy in a short time.

Guyanese in Saint Lucia celebrated their anniversary a day later instead of the 23rd due to the exhibition, the occasion was hosted on the 24th. While a minute of silence was observed for those who died as a result of the flooding in Guyana and thousands of dollars were raised at the function for the Flood Relief effort, they marked the occasion in the usual grand Guyanese tradition as they got together to award outstanding sons and daughters living in Saint Lucia for their sterling contribution to the local community. Honourees this year included such persons as Ron Savory, a Guyanese Artist, Noorani Azeez, a dynamic young administrator who for the past five years has led the charge of training young persons in several skills for the field of work, and Edward Harris, an Entrepreneur, Private Sector Advocate, Freelance Journalist and Community Worker. A student, Miss Paul was presented with a plaque for her recent success at the CXC examination. It has become a feature of the Anniversary Awards ceremony to bring to the attention of the nation brilliant Guyanese students who are successful at the CXC and "A" Level examinations.

Guyanese living in Saint Lucia usually come together in the hundreds to celebrate their Republic Anniversary. Mr. Maniram Prashad, Trade Advisor to the President who was in Saint Lucia to represent the President at the officially opening of the exhibition attended the ceremony and was loud in his praise for the level of commitment exhibited by the gathering and the manner in which the programme was presented. He was particularly impressed with the cultural presentations as he participated in the singing of folk songs, listened to poetry, watched Indian dancing and a skit entitled the Banana Man. It was an evening that will long be remembered. He also noted that we sang all the verses of the National Anthem.

Once again, the Guyana Saint Lucia Association with the full cooperation of the Honorary Consul for Guyana to Saint Lucia, Mr. Lokesh Singh has shown that Guyanese wherever they are can come together, stand up and be counted for their contribution to their communities.

This year, the celebration spilled over to the Guyana Exhibition which was mounted over the weekend, February 25 – 27. The determination of Guyanese businesspersons to move forward was demonstrated in the level of participation and the quality of the exhibition. Over 50 companies were represented. Hon. Philip J. Pierre, Minister for Commerce, Tourism, Investment and Consumer Affairs, and Hon. Ignatius Jean, Minister for Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries participated in the official opening ceremony of the exhibition which was well attended.

Residents flocked to the venue to secure bargains and in my conversations with the exhibitors, they have been able to test the market and now see Saint Lucia as an important destination for their products and services. Art and Craft items, Pharmaceuticals, Noni Juice, Sandals, Household Furniture, and as usual Guyana Rums were on hand. The exhibitors included large, medium and small companies. As the launch of the long-awaited CARICOM Single Market and Economy – CSME approaches, I can see Guyanese being among the principal movers and shakers as they take their skills to the other islands of the region. The various trade promotion agencies should get busy in promoting the culture of joint ventures in the region and guiding entrepreneurs in the art of duplicating themselves in collaboration with others.

Lots of good things are beginning to happen in the region and especially in Saint Lucia, a place where many Guyanese are making a contribution and influencing developments within the wider region. Guyanese and Saint Lucians have a great history of working together and as the years go by, we have seen a greater appreciation for the contribution of each other.

Although Guyana is in a state of preparations for elections, it is not just business as usual with respect to attracting investors to the country. I had the pleasure of spending Emancipation Day in Georgetown and thereafter took some time off to look around the country and speak with decision makers in the government and private sector.

I have been hearing so much about the developments in Region 3, especially in the Parika district that I insisted on seeing the developments in the district for myself. I was very impressed with the level of business activity which has transformed the area. It was an eye opener. Imagine on a Sunday that major firms like Courts, Gafoor's were opened for business. The business houses were opened, every type of grocery, ground provisions, green vegetables and fruits were on sale, vendors lining the street on both sides for over a mile, leading to the Parika Stelling. The area was bustling with enterprise and is well serviced by banks. This district has evolved primarily because it is strategically located to serve the islands and communities along the Essequibo River.

I had the pleasure of speaking with Mr. Geoffrey Da Silva, Chief Executive Officer of Guyana Office for Investment (Go Invest) in his office on Camp and Church Streets and he outlined the several developments taking place in the country and pointed to the many successes of Go – Invest. He was very proud of Guyana's Open Trade Policy and he informed me that already there is a steady flow of investors and visitors seeking to establish a presence in Guyana. This influx will substantially increase with the establishment of the CSME. In the immediate term, with the level of infrastructural development and the obvious demand for domestic, commercial, industrial and institutional buildings, there is a serious need for construction workers in Guyana and it is very likely that workers will have to be sourced from outside the region. This situation is very much the same in the other states as they prepare for CWC 2007.

It should be of interest to note that the Government of Guyana has opened up to investors an opportunity to receive waiver of Customs levies on building materials and furnishings to erect a minimum of ten houses in time for Cricket World Cup in 2007 for the accommodation of visitors, with the option of selling the buildings after CWC 2007.

This is a great investment for groups of Guyanese, friends and business associates coming together to make an investment for profit or simply to develop communities for their own retirement. Anyway, you just can't lose.

There is also investment opportunity in the transportation sector, any passenger bus with 30 seats and over could be imported Duty Free. The demand for transportation will be strong in the future as the country steps up its preparations for CWC 2007 and the spin off tourist arrivals subsequently.

Go-Invest is promoting investments and manufacturing, and the Guyana Marketing Corporation is collaborating with this agency in its export drive. In recent years several Trade Missions were mounted in several islands of the Caribbean, Toronto and during the month of August, 2005 a Mission will head for New York.

A final investment opportunity I would like to draw to your attention in this article is in the retail sector where the Gafoor Group of Companies is in the completion stage of a Shopping Mall with three floors and approximately one hundred units. This will be an excellent opportunity for the Diaspora to invest in several areas of business as in discussion with the CEO of the Group, he showed me the floor plans which include allocation for Super Market, Food Court, Bank, and several other services which will attract customers for most goods and services.

GUY EXPO 2005 is scheduled to be held on September 23-27, 2005. I will like to encourage you to visit Guyana at this time and attend this exhibition so that you could have a firsthand look at the many goods and services that our brothers and sisters are producing and the level of success they are achieving. Last year acting in my capacity of President of the Guyana St. Lucia Association in collaboration with Mr. Lokesh Singh, Honorary Consul for Guyana to St. Lucia, I had the pleasure of leading a delegation comprising of 12 St. Lucians and Guyanese. This year it is hoped that with the favourable results reported from the last experience, the delegation would be increased by a minimum of one hundred percent.

If you are keen on investing, do not ignore Guyana, it is a real investment destination. There are lots of opportunities and many areas of activity begging for new and innovative ideas. Guyana still has opportunities that will create substantial wealth for those who have the ability to see the big picture where Guyana will evolve as a major player among the English-Speaking Caribbean States. A new day is dawning for Guyana as we witness the developments in the Bauxite, Gold and Diamond Mining, Bridging of the Corentyne River to Surinam and hopefully oil will be on the cards as well in the not too distant future. It might be a good thing to visualize what is yet to be actualized and begin to truly feel the potential so that the pride which is ours can come alive in us. #### Elections fever in the mother country & Dominica

The world's Catholic community has a new Pope – Pope Benedict XVI. Prince Charles is happily married to the love of his life. Citizens of England and the Commonwealth of Dominica go to the polls on May 5th. What a coincidence?

Here in St. Lucia, on April 19, 2005 in the usual ceremonial atmosphere, Dame Pearlette Louisy, Governor General gave the Throne Speech to both houses of Parliament with the theme "Continue to Progress and Prosper" outlining her Government's policies for the ensuing Budget year. Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, Dr. the Honourable Kenny D. Anthony presented a budget just short of a Billion EC Dollars, the amount is EC\$954.1 million with no new taxes. The Budget was presented under the theme "Consolidating Gains, Developing a World Class Destination and Enhancing Human Resource Capacity" The presentation was upbeat with a wide range of fiscal packages. Multiple projects are in the making in the tourism sector, road network development, and other services to meet the demands that will be placed upon the nation as a result of the Cricket World Cup 2007.

Back to politics, both Labour Parties in England and Dominica are heading to the polls but not in comfortable positions. Prime Minister Blair has to deal with the Iraq war while PM Skerrit has to deal with the Economy. It is the latter situation that I would like to comment.

I made a trip to Dominica a few days ago and during my stay which was about eight hours but very intense, I met with a leading politician in the country with whom I discussed the possibility of taking a project to Dominica but as is expected politics was discussed. The Opposition United Workers Party (UWP) is calling the voters to remember how things were good under them and return of the UWP will bring prosperity to the nation. It is true that for some reason they were able to emit office without the state of economic despair affecting their government. But the question is, could they have prevented the situation which developed under the current government? The Labour Government in spite of losing two Prime Minister by death was able to come to terms with the economic crisis and the uneasiness within the country was quelled.

PM Skerritt, though a young politician who cannot boast of being politically experienced, is loved by the people and has been able to hold the party together. Will it be prudent to return the present government to office and have them continue their programme of recovery or to replace the current government with the UWP which has been more flamboyant? A billion-dollar question is what has been the PM's relationship with the youth of Dominica and as a result what about the youth factor in the upcoming elections? Will the youth be the deciding factor, the ones to give Prime Minister Skerrit an opportunity to rule the country on his terms for at least one full term? This should be a youth campaign where the young people take the lead and take a stand on which party should win. A national youth conference is in order in the final days leading up the elections.

Should the Labour Party pull off the upcoming elections, there is one area that must be improved, that is their engaging of the citizens in the affairs of the nation. There is urgent need to improve communication. If they were to lose this election it would be due to their lack of engagement of the people to allow greater understanding and participation in their own affairs. It wouldn't be long before the results of the elections will be known. The Billboards are very impressive and make the candidates come alive; the campaign managers are doing a great job in marketing their candidates. I pray that in the end the electorates will make the right decision and vote for a resounding victory for the party that will provide the nation with the best leadership at this time. Dominica the rest of the region is watching you. A friend of mine went so far as to suggest that a Labour win in Dominica, could send a signal to the rest of the region, especially the OECS, noting that St. Vincent and St. Lucia are up for elections within a year's time.

This is an important election in the history of Dominica and will prove the level of political maturity attained by the citizens. If the information provided by the taxi driver who took me across the country from the airport and back is anything to go by, it is going to be one hell of a toss-up at the polls.

We are a people who believe in the wonder working power of the Creator but the underlying this fact is that he gives us the desires of our hearts and gives us the leaders we deserve. We are warned that if we select leaders with no vision, we shall perish. It is therefore necessary for us as voters to have a spirit of discernment.

# #7 It is momentum time for CSME and herbal medicine in the Caribbean!!!

I find myself engaged in recent weeks in some important initiatives as the institutions within CARICOM fast forward the process to the formal implementation of the CARICOM Single Market and Economy, (CSME). It is unfortunate however, that at this late stage, there are still voices being heard that we are not ready for the 1st phase of CSME.

This is one time that politicians will have to take a position in the best interest of the people. The masses seem not to be convinced that CSME is good for them as they seek to protect their turf. It is just a matter of holding on to what you have no matter what. The intellectuals in our midst have not done enough to unravel what seems to be complex in the minds of the simple. It is the same old story. What we don't understand we do not seek clarification; we ignore it totally and speak negatively about it. There is where we find ourselves at this late stage of the process. This is yet another demonstration of our intellectuals giving back to society.

The successful implementation of the CSME should be a top priority of all those who can be considered leaders in their community. We have been leaving the poor and uneducated among us to fend for themselves. This is not a very encouraging state of affairs and already we are seeing the results in several areas, especially that of crime. The time has come for us to be a more caring society. Information and education to the entire community is vital. Information is to sensitive citizens about developments and education is to equip them with knowledge to use it. CSME is in dire need for such an approach. No one can deny the fact that our citizens throughout the region need to be engaged in a dialogue on the benefits of CSME and its impact on the social economic and cultural future of our people. Freedom to move freely within the region and to do what we need to do to better the lives of our people is an important platform for progress.

The implementation of the CSME is timely as the opportunity for travel and employment in the developed world is fast closing in on us. Visas are becoming more difficult to obtain and immigration conditions within the states are very difficult with sanctions on those who employed undocumented workers. However, the realization that all is not well with the state of readiness as regards the CSME at this junction could give the process the push it needs in the final stage could be the impetus for the CSME movement to gain momentum as we are currently experiencing.

I had the opportunity to participate in a Regional Policy Forum on Trade Liberalization in Trinidad on June 15-16, 2005 sponsored by the Barbados based Caribbean Policy Development Centre (CPDC). A wide cross section of issues was discussed and participants were better informed about the state of play in the international negations as all roads lead to Hong Kong for the next round of trade negotiations. Dr. Clive Thomas presented a paper on the topic "Understanding the Dynamics of Coherence and Compatibility in the International Trade Agenda" He made a fundamental point which I feel obliged to share and that is that the posture of our negotiators is wrong. The sugar agreement has never been a preference arrangement. It was negotiated in the mid 1970 when the price of sugar was three times the price paid to us. We did not want an indefinite treaty but it was in the Europeans best interest to lock in a price. Today our negotiators should be seeking a buy out to bring closure to the agreement. My understanding from the position put on the table by Dr. Thomas is that the Europeans have an obligation to settle instead of just seeking concessions and aid support. The posture we take has serious implications if the Europeans are allowed to dictate the flow of funding in areas that they are disposed to as opposed to our specific needs. Since they are terminating an agreement pay us off and let us make our own decisions on how the money will be best deployed to meet our developmental and other needs.

The Forum looked at the OECS in the CSME, Gender Indicators, Genetically Modified Organisms, etc... Veteran Trade Unionist, Mr. George De Pena also made a presentation at the Forum. He lamented the lack of professional staff to deal with the several issues of the negotiations.

The Forum ended on the note that the challenges ahead must be met with all the vigor of our people and that the NGOs have a pivotal role to play. Our Heads of States within the CARICOM region meets in St. Lucia from the 3rd to the 6th of July, 2005 and it should be interesting to see how the movement to CSME will be treated. I am looking for a firm commitment to the process. The citizens should be given a clear signal that CSME is irreversible.

My next stop was at the 7th International Workshop on Herbal Medicine in St. Lucia, June 23-26, 2005. The joint conference was organized by the Caribbean Association of Researchers and Herbal Practitioners (CARAPA) and Caribbean Herbal Business Association (CHBA) with support from Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA), the Technical Centre for Agriculture and Rural Cooperation (CTA) and Centre for Development Enterprise (CDE). The theme for the Conference was "Advancing Caribbean Herbs in the 21st Century". It was the first collaborative effort between CARAPA and CHBA and it is the desire of all parties that the two organizations cooperate for the advancement of the herbal industry in the region. The conference was held at the Bay Gardens Conference Centre. Over 130 participants from the USA, Latin America, and the entire CARICOM Region attended the conference and several research papers were presented.

The industry is in its infancy and it is very clear that a lot has to be done to give it the acceptance that will be required for herbal products to gain the recognition that is necessary to establish itself as a viable industry. There are some interesting gains made to date at the level of the farm and the factory. A field tour was undertaken on day 3 of the conference which took participants to the National Herbarium and the Mamiku Gardens. It was an experience, especially when we visited Mamiku Gardens where one of the Directors was our tour guide. I am convinced that the problem which exists between Allopathic Doctors and Herbalists is due to the fact that in listening to the guide, it came across that if we follow the herbal way, there will be almost no need for medical doctors. Given the cure all status of the many herbs as explained to us by the well informed guide who supports his stories by internet research offering remedies for pain, cuts, cancer, flu, headache, etc., etc., it is very clear that we need to educate our population in the use of available herbs and to aggressively proceed to do what is necessary to provide scientific evidence on the herbs and their effective use. One area of concern is the required dosage of herbal remedies. A recent research indicated a movement towards acceptability of certain herbs by medical doctors. In some Latin American countries, there are herb patches alongside Health Centers. Noni is generally accepted in the region and some producers of the juice are making head way in their local market and are looking at possible exports.

The Conference concluded with a Dinner and Awards Ceremony. Dr. Compton Seaforth, Past President of CARAPA was awarded for his outstanding contribution to the success of CARAPA. Dr. S. A. Cuffy, ND, a Naturopathic Doctor of Natural Health Ministries, Brooklyn, USA was the Guest Speaker. He gave a recipe on "How to put Women in their Place" (that is a statement to think about) and shared with the audience what he considers the 7 Crown Jewels of Vibrant Health! 1) Detoxification, 2) Immune Fortification, 3) Make the Body Alkaline, 4) Proper Nutrition, 5) Exercise 6) Good Quality Water, 6) Peace of Mind.

CARAPA and CHBA held their Annual General Meeting during the conference. The outgoing Presidents Dr. Compton Seaforth and Dr. Henry Lowe of the two Associations did not seek re-election. The Executive of CARAPA comprises of the following members: Mr. Kofi Boateng – St. Croix, USVI, President, Dr. Gilbertha St. Rose –Benjamin – St. Lucia, Vice President, Dr. Yuri Clement – T/T, Secretary, Ms. Rose Rajbansee – T/T, Treasurer and Edward Harris – St. Lucia, PRO. The 8th Conference will be held in St. Croix in 2006. The elections of the CHBA produced the following results: Ms. Sandra Ereque Weekes – Barbados, President, Ms. Cheryl Bowles – B/dos, Vice President, Mr. Jorge Murillo Yepes – G/da, Secretary and Anselm Benjamin – St. Lucia, Treasurer,

The last two weeks have been hectic and it seems set to be very exciting times as we move to the count down to the launch of the CSME. The main indicator as to how we progress on the road to making CSME a reality is in the removal of barriers to trade and investments in the region. Some Governments are taking to process right down to December 31, 2005. Interesting, isn't it?

ST. LUCIA - SOUTH, A HIVE OF POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC ACTIVITY!

On Sunday August 28, 2005, there were two major events in the South of the island. In the Vieux Fort – North Constituency, the St. Lucia Labour Party held a run off for its Representative for the upcoming elections scheduled for the 1st half of 2006. This constituency was served continuously by Honourable Cecil Lay for almost a quarter of a century. He indicated his intention some time ago not seek another term and as a result a very aggressive campaign was launched to fill the vacancy. The three-cornered race, Mr. Moses Jn Baptiste secured victory with excess of over five hundred votes more than his nearest rival, Mr. Vernon Valmont. The other contestant was Mr. S. Jeffrey who made a poor showing with 25 votes out of a total of over 1,400 hundred votes.

Just a few minutes away from the political conference which saw Mr. Jn Baptiste securing the election to represent his party at the upcoming national elections, The St. Lucia Industrial and Small Business Association (SLISBA) was holding its 16th Annual General Meeting at the Coconut Bay Resort, originally Halcyon Days which was subsequently owned by Club Med and recently acquired by a Jamaican Group and was completely refurbished and reopened a few months ago. Special guests at the AGM included Acting Prime Minister Hon. Philip J. Pierre, Minister of Commerce, Tourism, Investment and Consumer Affairs, Senator and Honourable Sandra Husbands of Barbados who attended the AGM in her capacity as President of the Caribbean Association of Small and Medium Enterprises (CASME), an umbrella organization representing Small Business Associations throughout the CARICOM Region. Senator, Hon Sandra Husbands is also the current President of the Barbados Small Business Association.

President Patrick Joseph in his report to the meeting was very critical about the way the Caribbean Single Market and Economy is proceeding without adequate consideration for the implications that will arise in dealing with the problems of small States such as St. Lucia. However, Hon. Philip J. Pierre assured the meeting that the critical component of the Regional Development Fund is to be made available for small states to be assisted in their thrust to be competitive which is a prerequisite to any formal agreement on the CSME. Hon. Owen Arthur, Prime Minister of Barbados is responsible for putting together the machinery to establish of the Fund.

Senator Husbands informed the meeting that CASME will assist member associations to serve their members in keeping with the demands of today's business environment. In a few years Senator Husbands increased the membership of the Barbados Small Business Association from 100 members to 500 with associate organizations boosting the membership by another 800. She spoke of the initiative being undertaken by Ms. Lynette Holder, Executive Director of CASME to negotiate a special Loan Programme for the membership of the various associations within CASME.

The meeting was attended by in excess of 100 businesspersons from across the island.

The By Law relating to the term of the Directors was amended by resolution from one year to two years. The motion was approved with one abstention. Mr. Patrick H. Joseph was reelected unopposed for a third extended term, 2005 – 2007. The Management Committee comprises of eight members including the Immediate Past President.

With assistance from the Government of a grant of One Hundred Thousand EC Dollars (100,000.00), SLISBA has a new Secretariat and with the support of CASME the association seems set to fulfill the mandate of the membership. The Secretariat is located in the American Drywall Building on the Vide Boutielle Highway, Castries.

While the debate continues on the CSME, Barbados Coalition of Service Industries (BCSI) is leading a delegation of businesspersons to St. Vincent and St. Lucia during the period August 29 to September 2, 2005. The businesspersons are seeking to form alliance with their counterparts in the two islands and intend to continue this thrust throughout the region. Joint Venture, Franchise and Distribution opportunities are being offered in areas of Training, Business Services, Events Management, Computer Sales and Service, Real Estate, Janitorial Services, Natural Skin Care Products, Professional Photography, etc.

Lots of interesting developments are in the making for St. Lucia. The negative impact of increased oil price which is now EC\$9.50/US\$3.50 per gallon at the pump does give cause for concern but the positive trends in the economy give hope. These are very exciting times in the Caribbean. There is never a dull moment in St. Lucia. The sun shines every day, even when it rains.

President Bharrat Jagdeo launched the 5-day Guy-Expo 2005 with the theme "Pride in our Industry" on Thursday, 22/09/05 and in his address to invitees to the official opening, set out the way forward for the economy and elections in 2006. He was very clear that investors are being encouraged to do business in Guyana and in his message stated – "My Government will remain unambiguously pro-business, pro-employment and pro-growth. We continue to put in place the ingredients needed to support the creation of wealth. This is a key part of our vision to provide our country with a platform that allows all our citizens to live fulfilling lives. Our macro-economic climate is stable, we have one of the most open economies in the world, and the investment regime offered to support new investment can compete with any in the region". This Business Forum was organized by the Guyana Office for Investments and the New Guyana Marketing Corporation to explore possibilities of establishing a Permanent Show Room and a Marketing Agency in St. Lucia to boost exports of Guyanese agricultural and non-agricultural products to St. Lucia. Guyanese and St. Lucian businesspersons are supportive of this initiative and a number of opportunities on both sides have opened up as a result of their interaction.

While in Guyana, St. Lucian Entrepreneurs took time off to visit places of interest and experience Guyanese hospitality at first hand. It is always a state of shock and awe when persons who have been exposed to the negative press that Guyanese and Guyana receive from time to time. It was just an awakening to those of the delegation who visited Guyana for the first time. This is what the Executive of the Guyana – St. Lucia Association seeks to achieve as they expose St. Lucians to Guyana.

The exhibition was scheduled for 22-27/9/05 but was extended for another day to facilitate the crowds.

Looking towards the future, with increased awareness of Guyana products and things Guyanese, the stage will be set for increased activity at all levels in the period ahead. The next trip organized by the Guyana – St. Lucia Association should include a visit to Madia in the interior of Guyana where many St. Lucians have called home for many years and many have no desire to go anywhere else. The indications are that Elections will be called in St. Vincent and the Grenadines before the end of 2005 and in St. Lucia and Guyana sometime in 2006. Interesting times are ahead politically and on all fronts the incumbents look good. Opposition parties are not as organized as they should be to offer any formidable challenge. In the case of Guyana with 32 parties, it is a comical affair though others may feel it is democracy at work. I feel the time has come to set some standards in the nomination process that will only bring serious political parties in contention.

It is very disturbing to hear the doom and gloom positions being taken by Guyanese while neighbouring Entrepreneurs are seeking out Guyana for investments. The past week recorded a visit from the Barbados Coalition of Service Industries. It is very clear that after the Christmas holidays it will not be business as usual as most businesspersons will go on hold until the elections have passed. This is in sharp contrast to the smaller islands where it is business as usual elections or no elections. But in the MDCs, everything is linked to politics and businesspersons are always positioning themselves to benefit from the outcome of an election. Many of them will bet against the odds that a non-starter in the political race will win all because of their relationship with the leadership of the party they are backing.

In the context of Guyana, the constitution as it relates to appointment of parliamentarians is stacked in favour of the PPP/Civic. I was in Guyana for a few days this month and I continue to hear the call for a national front government, a coalition government, call it what you will but it all means sharing the administration of the country. In this context the PPP/Civic can claim it is doing that with the leader of the UF as a cabinet minister and taking on responsibilities for the Ministries of Commerce and Tourism. But everyone is seeking a wider involvement. Will this happen the next time around. I remember in 1997 when as Campaign Manager for the then Guyana Democratic Party – GDP headed by Mr. Asgar Ali former Finance Minister in the PPP/Civic first administration that I organized a conference of all the political parties at that time to discuss the prospects of a Coalition Government as at that time the hopes were high based on the implementation of the voter photo ID which was a wasted effort.

It is very clear that if there is going to be any movement in the parliamentary arrangement it will have to be initiated by the PPP/Civic. It will have to be at their pleasure. I feel that good governance is only practiced when a government acts in the best interest of the people. It is time that a referendum be called to test the type of parliamentary elections the people want. Is it first past the post or is it proportional representation? It is time to let the people decide. Maybe with all the talk, the people may decide that they like things as they are because don't forget this new parliamentary act which governs parliamentary appointments was given birth by a genius. But until then, there will be grumblings.

The Alliance for Change is the talk of the town. It will take a lot of money for them to get organized in time for the upcoming elections but the team of leaders seem set to make a major statement in the next elections. Talk is cheap but we have seen again and again when it gets down to the crunch it the same old story – PPP or PNC. So now what is new? Two brilliant young lawyers just past the age that we can refer to them as youths but young enough to be considered young men are presenting themselves. Shared leadership, two presidents in one term. I believe this needs some rethinking. It would be good enough for me that the two leaders serve alternate terms. It has been shown in the USA where Presidents do badly in their second term and generally after four years in political office, it takes its toll so change in four years seems good to me but this new innovative idea of sharing the presidency mid-term, if that is what the people want, let them have it. Run a few polls and get to the pulse of the people. We live in an electronic age. This would be the first step in the walk on Democracy Street for the AFC.

What new ideas are the AFC offering? One thing I would like to see and this is from my personal shopping list, that unlike the PPP/Civic which promised to revisit the constitution after their first victory and they did but ignored the parliament act that upholds proportional representation and gives the winner a take all approach allowing the party with the highest votes to form the government thus blocking out completely the prospects of a coalition majority government. The AFC must place in its manifesto and constantly proclaim from its platform over the campaign period that they will revisit the constitution as a priority within the first 100 days to deal with the system of parliamentary appointment that will return the country to real democracy where FIRST PAST THE POST would be once again the system that puts the people's representative into parliament. (This is of course after a poll has been taken to confirm that the people need to go down that road). With the present system, parliamentarians are removed from the people and take collective responsibility for the whole country. That is not what allows for effective political interaction. A change to the electoral/parliamentary system is necessary. Use technology to assist in bringing the wishes of the people to the fore. For God's sake give the people a chance to say how they want to live their lives in a DEMOCRACY. What is so different with Guyana that it needs PR when the free world is happy with FPTP?

God is in charge and all men will be accountable for their deeds. Every election presents an opportunity for change for the better. Make the next election in Guyana special. God bless you all!!!

As if the destruction done to Cozumel was not enough when we got to Cost Maya the boat had to bypass that stop as the waves were too high and did not allow landing alongside the berth. At the earlier stops, tenders took the passengers ashore due to the size of the vessel.

In spite of the problems, most passengers were happy to stay on board and enjoy the many social offerings and of course the cuisine. When at sea or necessary to bypass a destination, the Casino was opened all day. There were two Formal Evenings on the ship and those persons who did not have appropriate attire could have rented on board. The entertainment programme was great with some exceptional shows. The orchestra was great and the social director was fun to listen to. In spite of my busy networking schedule, I did find time to dine with great people and attend the shows. It afforded many an opportunity to live large. A cruise ship is simply a floating hotel and I was fortunate to be on a Five Star vessel – the Carnival Miracle.

A new day will dawn on January 1, 2006 when all businesspersons will have the right of establishment within any State in CARICOM. Some people are scared at the thought that a man or woman arriving from Trinidad with a roti pan can establish a business in any island he or she chooses. What a development! While it seems so simple, it is very challenging to note that the cultural aspect in relation to foods in several countries is yet to be tasted around the region. It is hard to imagine that corn soup and doubles from Trinidad, and a good pot roast, and peas and rice from Jamaica are yet to be seen on the streets of St. Lucia.

There is a window of opportunity that should last for the first six months of 2006 and real estate will begin its upward climb. Beyond 2007 there will be no more deals but inflated market prices as demand will out strip supply. In the case of St. Lucia, it is only 238 square miles. Accessible Land must become scarce at some point. So, the time for action is now. Own a piece of the rock in any of your dream Caribbean destination NOW!!!

Have yourself a Prosperous 2006 with an abundance of Health and Happiness! Keep the Faith. God is in charge.

It is interesting also to note that the support of the media in the development of our people is paramount. This past Christmas holiday season I did not listen much to the radio but the few times I tuned into the stations I am still to hear the Christmas songs of our local artistes. The same could be said about local calypsos, after carnival what? We are left to listen to the Trinidadian and Barbadian calypsos and soca. CSME is here with us and I do hope that the radio stations will give the consuming public more of what we produce locally. Let us begin by supporting our own. Play a substantial amount of St. Lucian music every day. How can we ask other people to do for us what we the ability to do for ourselves?

It is time for local businesspersons to invest in the music business. It is time to venture out and it will take us to make it happen. Let us stop attempting to do things all by ourselves, let us limit our risks by forming investment syndicates. The Chamber of Commerce needs to introduce an Investment Club this year giving guidance as to areas of investment and even go a step forward to manage the portfolios for a fee. The get together of Entrepreneurs & individual Investors should be held quarterly and the projects should be submitted by members of the Chamber and non-members. This is the time for innovation and creativity. We must find creative ways to make us get out of the box where everybody is doing what the other is doing. If we believe taxi is making money, everybody buys a taxi and then no one makes money anymore.

Sometime in the year 1999 I was able to get the company I was associated with to invite Mr. Christopher Ram of Guyana to do a public session on the topic – Jump Starting the economy with Public Companies. It was well attended by accountants, lawyers and businesspersons but 6 years later has anything changed? The answer is NO! While many may argue that it not part of our culture to invest in public companies, many persons invested in a scheme that cost them millions. Our people are even investing in the African Free Money Scam. This proves the opposite of the popular belief. I feel that the time has come for our Government to drive investing in public companies by giving tax incentives to investors. The OECS Stock Market is only listing companies with proven viability. We were promised Small Caps whatever that is but what is needed is Penny Stocks allowing investing in startup companies at the regional level. The time has come for our leader in industry to take risks especially in the financial sector. It is going to be a paradigm shift from being risk averse to risk takers.

Until now our Governments in the region have taken a hands-off position with financial institutions but I am convinced that there is need for guidance to ensure that the productive sectors of the economy are financially energized. This distributorship was secured on the Internet for the entire region. I am certain that many more such opportunities are currently being pursued at the moment by other businesspersons. It can be done. Just do it. Timing is everything. This is a perfect time to venture out and establish relationships that will be impacted by international successes.

This year I encourage my readers to visit Trade Fairs. Get ideas, take a firsthand look at new products and services, arrange to represent companies that produce / market products that will appeal to consumers and get the distributorship for the entire region. Don't be timid about requesting the entire region as your territory. The chances are the persons you would be dealing with don't know what part of the world is the Caribbean and if they know about the Caribbean they know about the Western Caribbean. Very few times they will know about St. Lucia. So, I decided a long time ago when I introduce Saint Lucia to my clients or write about my country, I say that it is in the Caribbean and give its location and nearby islands.

If they hesitate, I draw their attention to the size of the country, its population and I seek to justify my request. The CARICOM States now CSM have a population of six million. Go for all the countries if you still get a roadblock, at the least you should get the OECS. Negotiating the territory is vital and exciting. If you are not aware of the different States of CARICOM check it out at www.caricom.org.

Looking at Trade Fairs, I sincerely hope that some of our businesspersons involved with technology visited the 2006 International Consumer Electronics Show which was opened in Las Vegas on January 4, 2006. Microsoft Chairman, Bill Gates gave the keynote address in which he presented his company's plans for the next 12 months. This show should have been a must visit for business executives involved with technology. The latest Gadgets were on display.

It is all about taking your rightful place in the world of business. Associations must be more involved, for many years there has been talk about bulk buying of raw materials, consolidated shipments and most important the support services of incubators where fledging businesses would be provided with furnished office space, receptionist, accounting services and counseling. Attending trade shows could be undertaken by the Associations and provide the contacts to their membership in the related category on a bid basis or promote a programme with an entrance fee so that the Association could cover its expenses and earn some income.

Unless the relationship between Associations and their membership improves there would definitely be a need for a shift in representation. If Associations fail to step up to the table with innovative approaches the need for Advocates/Lobbyists would be the alternative. More contracts need to be given to Consultants by Associations to provide services in areas such as business opportunity surveys and trade show reports, just to name a few. The need for a change in approach if we are to secure a place in the Global Market is necessary. It is imperative that we do all that is necessary to ensure that members can see what is in it for them.

A unique development emerged a few months ago where the Immediate Past President of the St. Lucia Manufacturers Association and its current President emerged as President and 1st Vice President of the St. Lucia Chamber of Commerce. Thus, for the first time in the history of the Private Sector in St. Lucia that Manufacturers and Distributors have a real opportunity to forge collaboration among the membership of the two Associations. The opportunity should not be missed. Joint initiatives should be undertaken by the two Associations and I dare say that the St. Lucia Industrial and Small Business Association (SLISBA) should not be left behind. SLISBA should be an active participant by invitation to collaborate in programmes. Then there is the Chamber of Agriculture and the St. Lucia Hotel and Tourism Association, and to support all the private sector associations in their memberships' relations with employees is the St. Lucia Employers' Federation. This Association's role will be vital when the promised Labour Code is implemented.

The future is challenging; the solution is simple. Associations must expand their areas of cooperation among each other and their membership. We have a window for the long felt need for a St. Lucia Private Sector Council/ Organization.

It is time for us to put our support behind the Private Sector Associations in our country make them strong and viable. Our dream should be to see all the Associations housed in one building. We have the structure for good things to happen. St. Lucia is the most organized Private Sector in the OECS sub region. Let us move it forward by being strong at home and linking it to regional and international private sector associations.

It is timely to request that the SLHTA begins a campaign with Town Hall Meetings to sensitize property owners and potential owners about involvement in the Industry showing the way to owners of large buildings to enter the bed and breakfast (B&B) segment of the industry and begin a series of training/sensitization programmes to bring small hotels and B&B properties up to speed if this is not already happening. There must be a way to give guidance to those who believe that there is money in the Industry so that their entry into the industry would not be based on a false premise. The offering of specialized services and information that will impact upon the decision-making process of potential investors within the private sector cannot be over emphasized. We are constantly reminded that we are living in modern times when the old things are passed and everything has become new. Why am I referring to these issues? What relation do these things have to business? It has a lot to do with business. Crime restricts business. In Jamaica, the uptown folks would not go down town after six pm. As a result, the restaurants, clubs and bars downtown suffer. The level of sales is a lot lower than what could be achieved, all because of the violence in the downtown area. We need disciplined citizens who will uphold decency and live with dignity. The quality of citizens in a country dictates the quality of life. When there is discipline in a country, the people in the country, residents and visitors alike would feel free to move about, enjoy the social and cultural atmosphere and business will prosper. These are powerful arguments that necessitate action on the part of businesspersons and government to refocus their priorities to ensure that a proper foundation is built and sustained to maintain a social and economic environment that is compatible with the lifestyles that today's businesspersons and tourists are seeking out around the world. Tourists want to do those things that are unthinkable where they live – they are in search of freedom. They are looking for countries that are investor friendly and welcome tourists.

In giving credence to the foregoing suggestions that are primarily based on giving back to the community to prepare our young people to be better citizens and employees, Government should consider in its budget proposal tax incentives for companies and individuals who contribute to human and community development. For example, the Government of Canada allows donations to charitable organizations through Charitable Trust Funds. Citizens contributing to such funds get a premium on the amount contributed. I learned that in the Toronto if someone puts a C\$1.00 into the fund, that person could claim C\$2.32 against their current year's tax assessment. It must be noted that such programmes are not continuous, they may run for a few years and be discontinued and then another programme comes along. Just maybe given our financial circumstance 50% above the EC\$1.00 could be a start. Do you wish to venture a calculation if such a programme is implemented and employers and employees could participate? Some persons keep on using the phrase that we must think out of the box but I would like to add that we must look for workable precedents as we travel around the world. Ask questions and look around. There are many things that we can find to adapt to our circumstances even if at a lesser degree.

I am a strong advocate for the Multi-Level Marketing (M.L.M.) industry. I feel that many good products that can benefit our citizens in improving their health and afford them the opportunity to maintain healthy lifestyles are being denied them because of our market size, but in many instances the freight and customs levies are the real hindrances. I feel that many of our unemployed could be beneficially utilized and given an opportunity to earn a decent living, and live a lifestyle that many can only dream of. Unfortunately, the high freight charges and customs levies previously alluded to, limit the participation of many persons in the industry. It is important to note that this is a global industry and with the effective use of the internet, many in our midst could enjoy the lifestyle that they can only dream of in their **FREE** MLM E-BOOK situation. There are many opportunities to improve the lot of the small man and this is the time for those of us who believe that change is possible to rally around those who are in positions to influence those changes. It all began last Saturday evening when I journeyed up to Vieux Fort to meet a very dear friend of mine who manages one of the top 5 businesses in Grenada, and for almost 20 years I have felt being a part of that corporation. It's all about taking ownership. Every time he visits St. Lucia, we get together mostly in Castries where we wine and dine but this time it was different, in a different part of the island where he cooked a meal for me and members of his team. I looked around in awe as this man humbled himself to cook and serve me and his subordinate staff.

This extremely successful business executive remembers the initial negotiations I undertook to establish the company he runs when on the eighth day after the intervention or invasion depending on who you speak with, I arrived in Grenada to talk business while the country was yet being brought back to normalcy. Keeping relationships and remembering others for their contribution is vital for continued success in life and in business. Who says that sentiments should not be attached to business? You should love your business, love the people who assist you in the day to day operations to help achieve success, and love the people who support you as customers and well-wishers. No one succeeds by their efforts alone. We are all interdependent upon one another.

I awoke on Sunday full of memory of the last evening and the lessons learned, especially that of humility. I looked forward to meeting a young man with whom I made an appointment since I would have been in the area. That meeting was based on deciding upon an initiative that would help other young persons in St. Lucia to follow a proven path of success for which training is freely available. It was interesting that the 30-year-old gentleman took time off on his birthday to meet with me. I have learnt that great organizations are built with a dedicated leader inducting one person at a time and teach that person to duplicate the experience.

On Tuesday I was invited to attend a meeting convened for stakeholders called by the Ministry of Communication and Works where arrangements were outlined for Phase 1 of the Castries - Gros Islet Highway Improvements Project from Vigie to Choc. Financing for the project is in place provided by the Government of Kuwait and the contractor is CCC, Kuwait. Minister, Hon. Felix Finisterre gave the assurance that everything is in place and his Ministry has taken into consideration matters that plagued other major projects in the past. Unfortunate many of the bypasses that could have been considered as alternative routes will be closed for drainage and water distribution works. To ease the traffic congestion and confusion when frustration sets in, an experienced Traffic Manager was appointed and the police presence would be visible. I represented SLISBA at this meeting and I had an interest in looking out for the small businesses. During the question and answer period, I made a plea for those who have invested substantially in heavy duty equipment, trucks, block making, quarrying and sand mining. The employment of a few persons is not enough. We must ensure that the investments of our business class are not ignored. Unfortunately, the response was not very encouraging as I was informed that there could be no pressure brought on the contractors to do anything that they don't want to do. In relation to the smaller trucks, they would not be feasible in such a large project. However, we see locally owned heavy-duty trucks on our roads that can be used on the project. I feel that the contractors should make a conscience call and attempt to be considerate in the circumstance. I requested that a meeting be convened for small businesspersons as one will be for pedestrians as a result of a strong plea from the P.S. of Education who was concerned about school children using the road, since the meeting only discussed traffic

We were assured that everything would be done to limit the congestion during the road works. This is a case of sacrifice. It is said no pain, no gain. In the event the 1st phase of the road is not completed before the CWC2007, the work would be stopped and cleared up and recommence after the matches. The contingencies seem to be in place for whatever outcome and the stake holders seemed prepared to make the sacrifice.

I passed the 27th Anniversary of St. Lucia's Independence quietly, reflecting on the opportunities I was afforded in this beautiful island and the contributions I was allowed to make, while feeling the pain of the situation which presents itself in the land of my birth – Guyana, where my brothers and sisters celebrated our 36th Anniversary as a Republic.

The real joy I experienced over the period of important Anniversaries was when I presented a gift of a refrigerator and a stove on behalf of the Guyana – Saint Lucia Association to the Principal of Donnatar School and Vocational Centre on the day of 36th Anniversary of Guyana as a Republican State 23/2/06.

The Bible says "cast your bread upon the water and it shall be returned to you many times over" You only get back what you give away. We should take some time off to assess the value of what we do. IT IS TIME FOR BUSINESSES TO FORMULATE STRATEGIES TO HELP CONSUMERS WITH THE HIGH COST OF LIVING?

I take this opportunity to extend condolences to the Rapier family on the passing of Mr. William Rapier. The business community has lost a leader and a friend.

As I write this article, the world observes World Consumer Day. Everyone is a consumer and at some point, comes face to face with the injustices that are meted out to consumers. The observance of this day could not be more relevant than at this juncture where consumers everywhere are reeling under the cost of fuel. While the oil magnates are heaping up billions of dollars in oil profits, the people are suffering. The inflationary prices due to the fuel cost has affected every economic sector, manufacturers, distributors, retailers, service providers and the end users of goods and services. Oil is at the root of all the ills in relation to high prices for consumer supplies.

Today's businesspersons need to apply empathy and ultimately restraint in maintaining mark ups that will further aggravate the high cost at source. The reality of the moment will create a void for reasonably priced goods and services and push manufacturers to go offshore seeking out low cost producers and distributors to explore the Far East/Asian markets for cheap supplies especially in the area of foodstuffs. This could be disastrous for local and regional manufacturers. This situation demands reasonableness on the part of all operators of businesses.

Manufacturers should embark on an aggressive campaign to sensitize distributors and retailer to employ strategies that will keep manufacturing entities in the region in business. If the manufacturers ever needed the distributors and retailers, it is now. We can be heading down a road that could see radical changes in markup structures that will almost force small retail outlets to close shop. It could be quite possible to see the introduction of discount stores with markups of ten to fifteen percent across the board. This would be the region's response to dollar stores in the U.S.A. The emphasis would have to move from markup to sales volume. This can also set off an era of inferior goods with distributors seeking to achieve cheaper goods.

However, it is the small businessperson who should be more flexible and no one is better equipped to deal with times of hardship than the small businessperson. This is the time for market niches where with the right connection, the businessperson with no distributorship contractual relationship could source staples and other demand products within a specific range, for example: - napkins, paper towels and bathroom tissues. With a good location, a small retailer could move a few 40ft containers per month. Here is a suggested theme for such a business, "Everything for the Bathroom and the Laundry". Proctor and Gamble, truck load offers could be an option. Do you know that you can buy truck loads cheaper than quoted on many companies Export list prices? Trinidad led the way in this type of small business, Barbados has followed with the small vendor road side sales from trucks or under a tent. It is time for more of us begin to use internet-based search engines to follow trends and get information on businesses and products.

I don't have to itemize the negative impact of fuel prices on our everyday lives. It is everybody's business to survive the onslaught of high prices in every area of our existence. The unfortunate thing is that when prices go up, they seldom go back down. It is for this reason why it is necessary to make an appeal for restraint. In the meantime, consumers should get together and purchase their essential consumer supplies in bulk making use of wholesale prices.

While the prices are moving up, there is going to be a need for financing for businesses to cope, especially the manufacturers who's raw and packaging materials are increasing with every shipment, and other expenses that put pressure on their cash flow. In preparation for this article, I spoke with a manufacturer who has a local distribution network and exports to CARICOM Member Countries and beyond. He has singled out the cost of moving freight in and out of his operation as the most difficult item to cope with as on both sides of the situation freight increases cost. In our discussion he gave me some examples: Less than Container Loads (LCL) Inbound from Miami, before the oil increases was US\$2.75, now it is US\$4.75. Outbound US\$2.85, now US\$5.85. Containerized Cargo from Miami, US\$1.300.00 per 20ft, now US\$2,100.00. US\$2,300.00 for 40ft, now US\$3,500.00. Outbound freight to the Caribbean increased by 55% while to international destinations as much as 55-60%. Inputs into manufacturing have risen 35-40%. Oil related raw and packaging materials have increased 55-60%.

These are very difficult times generally for all operators in the private sector.

The Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture held its first Business Mixer last Tuesday for the year and the turnout was encouraging. Mr. Ernest Hilaire, Managing Director of Cricket World Cup addressed the group and though he could not share information deemed restricted, persons present were given an update on developments which were considered satisfactory. He was not impressed with the response of the business sector to date and encouraged them to be more creative in finding ways to generate business from the opportunities that Cricket World Cup 2007 will present. I am anxious to see the introduction of presentations by entrepreneurs seeking startup capital or expansion of existing businesses. We need to get passionate about succeeding in our business in spite of the prevailing difficult circumstances.

Surfing the internet and doing business online could sometimes be costly and frustrating but most times challenging. When you investigate certain Free Offers, you end up most times with just an empty offer that grabbed your attention with no intention whatsoever of giving you anything free, by which time you are hooked. Many times, they suck you in with a free report only to end up adding your name and address to their data base and from that moment begin to bombard you with offer after offer in an endless succession. A new development is that a Subscriber's box is placed at the entry point to effect payment so if you change your mind in the process you are added to the data base anyway.

You must be able to exercise self-control and keep your credit card in your pocket. Never be too quick to take out your credit card to conclude any transaction on the web, sleep on it, most of the time sensitive offers will be there the next day and possibly a long time after. Then there are certain offers that we cannot access as a customer can only pay by Pay Pal or other clearing companies. In the case of Pay Pal they need you to establish an account with them which can only be achieved if you have a USA address and a bank account. Storm Pay is no more what it used to be; they are no longer processing credit card payments. Storm Pay is now Storm Pay Auctions, as can be found at www.stormpay.com Be careful how you put money into your credit card processing company account only pay as you go. Settle each transaction promptly from your credit card not from your account with the company. Deposits are for banks.

Everyone wants to own a website and everyone should but it will take upkeep and daily attention. Too many people just commission a website and leave it to tend to itself. No, it will not give you any results that way. You must keep it fresh. A great way to keep people coming back to your website is to post new pictures on a regular basis, let your clients know who is the employee of the month, get your customers testimonials up on your site, include a picture gallery, find creative ways of doing things. Get excited about your website, put your email and website address on every piece of correspondence and boldly on your envelopes, maybe a special rubberstamp could draw greater attention. Give it some prominence on your business cards. After all, if you can get people to your website that could be the best medium to introduce your company.

Too many people treat a website like any other acquisition which they are all excited about when new and after a while their interest just wane. A website should never be treated that way. Your website is your shop front and show window to the world. Potential clients from all across the global village will take the opportunity presented to them by the worldwide web to enter your domain. Have you seen the possibilities? Many of us have ideas but it will take technical and marketing skills to translate ideas into marketable products and services. If people with these two skills fail to get together, we will never be players in the global internet E-Commerce arena.

There is a problem that is plaguing many website owners – unscrupulous webmasters who want to retain control of the websites even though they are paid to develop it. They want to be responsible for renewing the domain registration and the hosting agreement, and in some cases they either fail to contact the owner of the site when the services are up for renewal or they forget completely to renew the services that are so vital to keeping websites connected to the worldwide web. You may recall a period when very popular local sites where being taken over by persons who sought to profit from defaulters and put pornography on the sites with the hope of blackmailing the original owners into buying back the sites at great cost to them. Securing web addresses of successful companies and creative names is a business. In recent times the brokers secure domain names and put them up for sale. The worldwide web is a fascinating place. It affords anyone the opportunity to establish a virtual presence be it an office, a service, a corporation, a retail outlet, whatever their heart desires, just purchase a domain name and off you go. That is your deed to your piece of the property on the world wide web.

I am inviting you to get involved in visiting local websites and send an email to the owners about your observations and I hope that at some stage someone will organize a campaign to identify the top 25 or 100 websites on the island. While it is very clear that businesses provide dollars in the economy of which a major portion is used to purchase goods and services, there is no real evidence that there is any willingness on the part of those who can do simple things to engage and energize the productive forces in the country, are willing to produce programmes that will create such an environment.

Telecommunication technology is also playing a major role and VOIP systems are making a difference. Try www.skype.com and talk to your friends around the world for free and there are many other services where a small fee is charged as low as two cents US per minutes. Today your emails can reach you via the cell phone and you can stay in touch with your home base from any part of the world and many other features are added regularly. It is time to expand the use of cell phones by introducing a Mobile Telephone Directory especially since mobile telephone customers no longer pay for incoming calls and most businesspersons print their cell numbers on their business cards.

While we claim to be living in modern times where technology has changed many things that hitherto would have been considered impossible to be achieved, we are now living with the evidence of its influence on society without truly embracing it. We must use technology in the same way persons in the developed world are using it to amass wealth. The most interesting aspect of the internet business is that there are several ideas that can be duplicated without copyright infringement.

Whatever the problems associated with the internet, it is still a place to establish a presence and utilize your right to accessing information you can use, but as with everything else apply caution, apply the old saying, more haste, less speed. Be cool when deciding to make an investment via the internet. Talk with friends and business associates if you are in doubt. The offers come to you well packaged that will get you in a mood that would make you part with your last dollar only to realize that the guy who is ranting and raving about how many millions he is raking in, it is really from the people who buy his manuals and not from the results of the manual he is offering. It is not that you should be upset with the guys who make money on the internet, it is the way some of them rob people outright as you will discover that most of the offers that promise to make you rich only take your money and leave you in a poorer state than before you parted with your hard earn money.

A scientific approach is now being undertaken to match hotel needs with production. I believe that the real issue is prices paid for locally produced goods, especially agricultural crops. An industry can only be sustained if it is viable. So, price will be the deciding factor. I feel confident that with Mr. Cuthbert Phillips driving the process and the renewed commitment by the facilitators, better days are ahead.

The gruesome death of one of the most beloved ministers in the PPP-Civic Government was gunned down along with his brother, sister and security guard. The continuing spate of violence targeting civilians has now turned to persons with political affiliation. This is a dangerous development and has put Guyana in a position that a release of a negative travel advisory could come at any time.

Then it was Trinidad's turn when former Prime Minister Hon. Basdeo Panday was given a prison term as a result of his failure to declare certain assets. It is the first time a former Prime Minister is sentenced to a prison term. It was a landmark ruling for the Judiciary within the region and it sends a strong message that no one is above the law. However, in such a situation, it is very clear that there was a lack of discipline.

The foregoing developments put a cloud over the countries that were affected by the two incidents and will affect their standing in the international community. Crime in all its forms and by all strata of society must be dealt with. No one should be above the law.

In St. Lucia, we are seeing more daring crimes being committed, especially armed robberies. Businesspersons can no longer ignore the reality that everyone is vulnerable and precautions have to be taken. Surveillance equipment has become necessary in all business places.

It is all about unachievable expectations of our youth. They see all the niceties of life around them and when they look at their positions, they feel hopeless. Many of us who were conscious about the fact that with each passing year hundreds of students leave school and enter the job market, are not surprised by what is happening as a result lack of employment opportunities. It must be noted that while there is lack of employment opportunities, there are some who are bent on lawlessness and refuse to seek gainful employment. Crime has to be fought at all levels and business leaders have to get directly involved in helping to find practical solutions. Creative ways have to be found to put idle hands to work. Growth in the small business sector is critical.

The webmaster at www.stlucia.gov.lc should be congratulated for a job well done. ENTREPRENEURS AND PROFESSIONALS CHALLENGED TO SHARE EXPERIENCES WITH STUDENTS!!!

Once in a while you are challenged to do the things you ask others to do. Talk is cheap, so is writing. A lot of persons say and write a lot of things but when called upon to take action on the things they speak/write about, even when it is within their sphere of knowledge, they shy away and sing another tune.

I continue to express the need to give back to the community in my articles, especially the sharing of ideas with the young and motivating them to be the best they can, so that they can contribute to the society which nurtured them. This week, I was asked by the Principal of the Vide Boutielle Secondary School, Ms. Ethelene Leonce to make a presentation to final year students who will be writing the CXC examination in a few weeks on the topic – "Choosing Business as a Vocation".

I was preceded by Dr. Rufina Frederick who shared with the students, techniques that will help them to be successful at the upcoming CXC examinations. She stressed the need for time management and the need to attempt an answer for all questions. I feel that with the recommendations of Dr. Frederick, the success rate of the school would be improved substantially.

Then it was my turn to share the excitement of being an Entrepreneur. I cited the situation where many persons don't stop to observe that all successful professionals invest in one form of business or another. Their choice investment is usually real estate. In Trinidad medical doctors have been known to put down their stethoscope and pick up their sharpened pencils and execute a pathway to fame and fortune. I drew the students' attention to a fundamental principle for achieving success, which is to strive to seek out every opportunity to gain knowledge. In the pursuit of knowledge, they were encouraged to become avid readers, as readers are leaders.

I stayed on to listen to Mr. Tony Nicholas, Editor of Yo, a feature section of the weekend Voice Newspaper, who spoke on the topic of "technology in the work place". He noted that in many offices, the computer is not being used in the way it was intended – to make its users more efficient. Instead too much time is being spent in chatting with friends and playing games on the computer, resulting in serious loss of productive time to employers. He made an interesting point about the use of cell phones and he noted that when some young persons are presenting themselves to potential employers in an interview setting, they want to maintain their normal contact and seek to respond to calls during the interview, not being courteous to the interviewer. He stressed that ideally the cell phone should be turned off so as to prevent the temptation of responding to a call in the midst of a job interview. He noted the limited vocabulary of young persons today and suggested this could be possible as a result of abbreviated words used in their chat room communication. There is a one-word description for everything – Great!!!

Generally, I will like to suggest that the Secondary schools expand the interaction between students and professionals/entrepreneurs by inviting professionals and businesspersons to share experiences with the students on a regular basis. Allowing enough time for the presenters to get their messages across and for the students to clarify points made or ask related questions of concern to them.

Congratulations to Ms. Leonce and members of her staff for a well-planned programme, and to the disciplined students who participated fully. They are truly a group of winners and although belated, I am pleased to congratulate the members of the debating team who walked away as winners of the Ministry of Youth Inter Secondary School Debate -2006.

The Budget is still very much on the minds of citizens and while concessions were made on Diesel fuel, the price of Gasoline is very likely to be increased in the days ahead. The oil prices are on the rise and continuing problems in Iraq and Iran are not helping. In the Spanish speaking region of the Americas, the current posture of Presidents in the region is not to be ignored and given the existing foreign policy of the USA, a war of words resulting in strained relationships could result that will further aggravate the oil situation. It is heartening to note that in spite our Prime Minister has not signed on to the Venezuelan oil facility, he has not turned it down. However, it is not free oil or oil at concessionary rate, it is a facility which is based on world market prices and will have to be paid for at some point in time. As we get involved in many areas of business and social activities, planning is essential. Success at what we do will largely depend on how effectively we plan. It is time to take a reality check. Are you getting enough out of my working day? Do you need to make adjustments in the times that you undertake certain tasks? Will starting the work day earlier help? Just ask yourself questions and demand answers, you can improve your present handling of your time and achieve more.

If you are going to be involved in shaping the future, meetings will feature prominently on your daily agenda as you seek to communicate your ideas to others. However, meetings need to be managed. I am convinced in many instances a lot could be done to shorten meetings. Most people distribute minutes of the previous meeting at the succeeding meeting. To get the best out of the current meeting, minutes of the previous meeting should be circulated well in advance. The minutes ideally should be circulated no later than seventy-two hours after the meeting was held so there will be adequate time to deal with matters that were discussed and need follow up action.

The minutes of the previous meeting is really a reminder of what transpired at the meeting and becomes the reference point for action between meetings. If this simple task is done in a timely manner, matters arising out of the last meeting could be substantive. A first commitment is that people must arrive at meetings on time. It is now the norm that no meeting starts less than half hour late. Some persons have several meetings in a day. If the first one begins late then that person is likely to be delayed at each of the other meetings which results in a considerable loss of time. Every effort should be made to start meetings on time and should not last for more than two hours.

Some people believe that since they are taking their time to be at a meeting, they must be allowed to take cell calls during the meeting. Many will deal with the call without excusing themselves from the meeting. As a result, there is a temporary halt to the meeting. Then everyone believes that he or she has a right to speak on the subject even if repetitions are obvious. Statements like, I agree with John when he said ...... and go on to repeat what John said. I don't believe this is fair.

It is time that cell phone companies educate users through television spots on the functions of cell phones, especially how to put them in the Silent Mode. The cell phone is great for its users to keep in touch but it can become an irritant if misused. It is all about etiquette, respect for others.

Too many Executives are not effectively allocating their time to ensure balance between work and social interactions. It is a sore point that affects family relations. I sincerely hope that this article will be a wakeup call for those who feel that they can get some more out of life by effectively managing their time. What about that family holiday? Try something new. Rather than the usual visit to family and friends overseas, try a cruise and spend quality time with the family. Renew your vows on the ship. After all life is not only about making money, it is about the quality of your life and as a result the memories that you will leave behind.

To leaders within the public and private sectors, are you aware that you can greatly improve the quality of life of the people who contribute to your success and that of your organization? Do you take time off to ask yourself the question – how can I improve the lives of those who contribute to the success of the organization? Just don't just ask the question, demand answers and take action. You can light up your world and that of others, manage your time in the interest of all.

I arrived in Guyana on July 7, 2006 and got into the AFC Campaign action immediately. Every day brings new challenges but I am supported by a formidable group of Activists and we are all very proud of the leadership of our Movement – Alliance for Change with the slogan "Don't Vote Race – Vote Change" and a sub theme "Unlocking the Future" It is interesting to note that our leaders were formerly attached to the major political parties in Guyana. Our Leadership comprises of: Mr. Raphael Trotman, Chairman and Presidential Candidate, Mr. Khemraj Ramjattan, Leader and Prime Ministerial Candidate and Mrs. Sheila Holder, Vice Chairman.

Guyana in spite of being located on the mainland of South America, due to its colonial past is the largest country in the Caribbean Grouping of English-Speaking Countries known as CARICOM. The country for several decades has been locked in racial strife which has been used as factor for attracting votes to the two major political parties.

The electoral system until now has been manipulated by both major parties when in government and massive rigging occurred in the past. Today with the help of the international donor countries changes in several areas of the process have finally been implemented and my Party is prepared to accept the final voters list which is scheduled to be released by the Guyana Electoral Commission (GECOM) www.gecom.org.gy within days.

As we approach Nomination Day, political parties are hard pressed to deliver on their list of Candidates for the National Elections and the Regional Democratic Council. We vote on Election Day for a President, National Assembly Parliamentarians and Regional Democratic Councilors. On Election Day, the party will need 2,000 Scrutineers to oversee the election. This calls for massive mobilization.

The Alliance for Change (AFC) although launched only 9 months ago is about the change the political landscape in our country. I am extremely excited about the possibilities and I am very pleased to be a part of the Campaign Team as the Campaign Operations Manager (COM).

During the 1997 campaign I headed the Guyana Democratic Party (GDP) Campaign under the Leadership of Mr. Asgar Ali. Today, things are different. The vote count at the place of poll will be handled differently and at the end, the Scrutineers will be provided with a tally of the votes which will be signed off by all present at the sealing of the ballot boxes which will not be subject to tampering as in previous times when boxes were taken to special counting places and disappeared in the process, only to be returned subsequently. The International Diplomatic Community has done a great job in ensuring that elections in Guyana are finally acceptable to the majority of citizens.

The ground swell of support is extraordinary and with the mood of the citizens today where everyone is calling for change, the exit poll and final declaration could well yield a WIN for the Alliance for Change (AFC) and the People of Guyana.

THE ALLIANCE FOR CHANGE WAS A REAL CHALLENGE TO THE TWO MAJOR POLITICAL PARTIES IN THE GUYANA ELECTIONS 2006

It is wonderful to be back in St. Lucia after an absence of two months. I am very pleased to update my readers on my mission to Guyana where I was a part of the Alliance For Change – 2006 Elections Campaign Team.

On the previous occasion when I was involved in a political campaign on behalf of the Guyana Democratic Party (GDP) I walked away without a seat but this time, it was different as in the Alliance For Change changed the course of history that for the first time a political party was able to secure five seats in the Parliament and twenty one seats across the Democratic Councils of the ten Regions of Guyana, and in the instance of Region 4 with the largest amount of voters, the AFC with 3 seats holds the balance of power, a situation which it had hoped to achieve in the National Assembly.

The AFC in just nine months of its existence decided to participate in the 2006 General Elections of Guyana with less than one month to campaign. The AFC took Guyana by storm and created such an impact on the electorate that the two major parties, the People's Progressive Party / Civic (PPP/C) and the People's National Congress / Reform – One Guyana (PNC/R) were so seriously challenged that they were forced to resort to the old race politics.

The theme of the AFC was "Don't Vote Race, Vote Change!" which resonated with the voters until in the final stages of the campaign, when the PPP/C and the PNC/R – One Guyana unleashed their artillery to demolish the gains of the AFC. Apart from subtle threats to their former supporters and intensifying their house to house campaign, preaching to the people that the AFC will split the vote and more importantly the PPP/C was telling their supporters that a vote for the AFC is a vote for the PNC/R while the latter was maintaining a line that their supporters must not split the vote. It all boiled down to a return to racial voting.

The principal objective of the AFC was to hold the balance of power in parliament in the first instance. This was almost realized when due to the intense pressure by the PPP/C and PNC/R – One Guyana in the run up to the elections, the actual results produced a reversal of the trend in our polls where the majority of East Indians voted for the PPP/C and the Blacks for the PNC/R – One Guyana. The racial overtones got so bad that the PPP/C was requested by the Media Monitoring Committee to withdraw their "great pretender advertisement" which highlighted the burning down of certain parts of Georgetown and aligning Mr. Raphael Trotman with that state of affairs as it was alleged that it was the PNC/R supporters that were involved in the hooliganism that resulted while he was still an Executive of that Party. That was very unfair and if there was one chilling effect, it was that advertisement and the Indian population reverted to their safety net in the protective arms of the PPP/C. Did we beg the situation that pertains today when for the past several days, the news headlines are dominated by a spate of fires?

Unlike previous elections, this time however, things were very different and the checks and balances were in place theoretically but varied somewhat in application. In spite of the problems that arose on Election Day, the observers were loud in their praises for GECOM and the Guyanese people who were finally able to participate in an election free of violent incidents. It must be noted that no observer team could have covered all the polling stations across the country. Sir John Compton, former Prime Minister of Saint Lucia led the Commonwealth Observer Team to Guyana for the 2006 General Elections.

In spite of the reports of the international observers, the rumors about Election Day activities paint a different picture. Was it free and fair? Yes, it could be deemed as free since there was no violent incident but when it comes to being fair, that's another matter. Let the officials of the Guyana Elections Commission (GECOM) explain why the Presiding Officers locked out Polling Agents from polling places, demanding letters certifying their appointment in spite they had identification cards which were provided by GECOM? After the morning fiasco the said situation developed at the close of poll with the Counting Agents, they were again asked for letters and this was not an isolated matter, it happened across the country.

The latest position is that GECOM infrastructure is no more, having been gutted by fire and all the records and computers destroyed. While the officials of GECOM claimed to have the computer records in a safe place, the votes unaccounted for in Region 10 will never be able to be verified. The AFC humiliated the PPP/C in Region 10, especially in the Kwakwani area where AFC did better than all other parties. I have a feeling that had all the boxes been accounted for the results in Region 10 would have been different, putting AFC in second place.

The final count of parliamentary seats is PPP/C 36, PNC/R-One Guyana 22, AFC 5, GAP/ROAR 1 and TUF 1. I continue to take care of my broken leg and hope to be out of the cast within a few days so that I can move around to catch up on the St. Lucia election campaign. Only if the political conditions could be in Guyana as there are here in St. Lucia – what a country it would be? I pray that St. Lucians will cherish their democratic freedoms and exercise their vote on Elections' Day.

With the spate of fires at key institutions, the future of Guyana is not exciting, especially at this juncture. We will have to wait and see how things shape up. Remember always that God is in charge, keep the faith.

While the current spate of criminal activities must be arrested, there is still a high level of goodwill for St. Lucia. A campaign to give visitors confidence that they are safe in St. Lucia must be mounted immediately. In the meantime, it should be everybody's business to maintain the positive image that we have developed and will continue to strive to maintain by promoting the use of the internet as a promotional tool by Blogging and other means such as Web links to spread the word around the world that St. Lucia is a unique destination for business and pleasure, and this must be the responsibility of every St. Lucian with access to a computer.

It is time the National Development Corporation, St. Lucia Tourist Board and the St. Lucia Hotel and Tourism Association develop an incentive scheme to reward persons who promote St. Lucia as a destination for business. Some years ago, I made a suggestion that Business & Tourism Representatives should be appointed around the world to introduce St. Lucia to their business and professional colleagues, families, relatives and friends. All Multi-Level Marketing Opportunity Meetings end with a challenge to opportunity seekers to write down the names and contact information of at least 25 persons who they would wish to share the opportunity with. It is a numbers game. The more people that we bring to their attention the joys of a St. Lucian holiday, the more visitors we will get to our shores.

So, I am now proposing an extension to my original suggestion that all persons residing in St. Lucia with access to a computer to get involved with the promotion of St. Lucia. Are you convinced that St. Lucia is Nice, Simply Beautiful, the Helen of the West Indies and much more? Then tell the world that St. Lucia has something special to share with them. We need to do more of this. Owners of websites must be encouraged to establish links with the following sites, www.stlucia.org www.stlucia.gov.lc www.stluciandc.com The challenge will be to fill all these rooms that will come on stream, beyond May 2007. There will be need for additional airlifts. There are operators of non-scheduled charters who are willing to look at St. Lucia but I guess some attention will have to be paid to our existing aviation laws and agreements. Maybe, it is time to revisit them. It is important to note that we are in competition with the U.S.A. to attract holiday makers and it is not only foreigners visiting the USA, it is the citizens of the U.S.A. who are being wooed to travel within the USA.

I am surprised that a Bed and Breakfast (B&B) Association has not yet got off the ground. It would be helpful if the SLHTA would give a group of interested small hotel owners a push in that direction. This does not mean that such a body will not work alongside the SLHTA. There was a time when most small business owners/manufacturers were members of the St. Lucia Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture while actively participating in the St. Lucia Industrial and Small Business Association. Then came a time when SLISBA thought that members who were involved in manufacturing should organize themselves and form a Manufacturers Association. That proposal got the interest of the members of the manufacturing sector within the Chamber as well, and in the end a St. Lucia Manufacturers Association was formed. Although some businesspersons did not see the need for the formation of such a grouping, the Association made great gains for its membership who today, play an active role in the Chamber while maintaining their focus to get the best for the manufacturing sector. This is the SLHTA's moment to shine and really hold the hands of the B&B sub-sector and lead them to the promised land. I have always contended that some things are better done by the persons who are directly involved in certain activities for themselves.

There are some fundamental lessons that we overlook in life and in business and in many instances, we need to get back to basics. Each guest that visits must be turned into an Ambassador for St. Lucia and the property where they stayed whether large or small. The principal aim of the operator should be the make the experience a memorable one. There are so many simple things that can be done. Capturing data is vital. Ask your guests to record their stay in the guest book, keep in contact with the guests.

If we understand the true meaning of the word – Hospitality, our attitude to the industry at all levels will change, and this must happen soon as with every passing day we become more dependent upon tourism.

#### THE INSENSITIVITY TO CUSTOMERS' NEEDS MUST END!!!

While we are bombarded with the talk of improved customer service, it is difficult to experience even the minimum level of service in some of the large organizations where hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent and continue to be spent on such training.

Service necessitates a level of passion for the job you are doing and empathy for the customers who seek your assistance. Maybe having a sales background raises my level of expectation when I deal with companies' representatives who take my money in exchange for goods and services and treat me with scant courtesy. In some instances, especially where there is not much choices, you are given the take it or leave it attitude and wait until I feel like attending to you. These types of attitude are a vexation to the spirit, especially when the persons involved know better and are expected to do better.

Does timeliness matters anymore? Don't leave for tomorrow what can be done today. Exercise a level of urgency and be responsive to the customers' needs.

Who is to guard the guard? How often does management take a check to see how their employees interact with the public in discharging their responsibilities. There must be some means of auditing the performance of your staff, especially in the area of customer service – the pillar for continuous growth in any business. Satisfied customers are repeat customers and beyond their own patronage, they are your best means of advertising through word of mouth, sharing their experiences in dealing with the company.

With all the noise about customer relations / service, how many times have you received a phone call enquiring if you are satisfied with the service that you received from the staff. In these days many firms do not even know their customers. I would like to suggest that a system be employed to record customer information that could provide information that will make management aware of who are their customers and what are their expectations. Large firms in the developed world have sophisticated means of keeping track of their customers and regular surveys keep them informed about changing buying patterns and general expectations of their customers.

In our region, not enough time is spent in finding out about the business/product, before an investment is made. Many times, multiple duplication of a business types make viable businesses no longer attractive and the investment is lost. Many of us have learnt this the hard way. In recent times, the Office of Private Sector Relations (OPSR) has been providing assistance to firms in the areas of Diagnostic Studies, Business Plans and Implementation Programmes. I feel that Customer Service should be an essential item in these studies.

Why I am laboring these obvious points? Many times, we fail to do the simple things that are so important and, in many cases, they make the difference in the experience. I feel that given the hive of activity as we approach Cricket World Cup 2007 and St. Lucia Jazz 2007 if we are to truly benefit from the positive spin offs from these major events, Customer Service must be the watch words, not the buzz words as our future will depend on the level of service we offer at every stage of our interaction with the visitors. I feel we should be very clear about what we expect from our Immigration and Customs Officers and every other aspect of business services during their stay on the island. The year 2007 is our year to shine and every citizen must be made aware of their role in and benefits from being the best hosts we can be.

St. LUCIA RANKED AS A WORLD CLASS BUSINESS DESTINATION!!!

Ecclesiastes Chapter 3, verses 1 – 8 are very instructive at this time. Verse 3 states that "to everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven". At this time in our country's history, St. Lucians are called upon to make a choice of Government that will demand that we assess carefully where we have come from, where we are today and where we are headed.

There is no doubt that St. Lucia has attained a favourable position among small island states not only in the region but in the world. This week, I witnessed the presentation of a World Bank Report on Doing Business 2007 which surveyed six member States of the OECS, namely, Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts-Nevis, St. Lucia and St. Vincent and the Grenadines. The Doing Business 2007 Report was undertaken in 175 economies with 10 topic areas: 1. Starting a business 2. Dealing with licenses 3. Employing workers 4. Registering property 5. Enforcing contracts 6. Getting credit 7. Trading across borders 8. Protecting Investors 9. Paying taxes 10. Closing a business

The results of the ranking are as follows: 1. St. Lucia 27, 2. Antigua and Barbuda 33, 3. St. Vincent and the Grenadines 44, 4. Dominica 72, 5. Grenada 73, St. Kitts-Nevis 85. When all 6 States are grouped together, they are ranked at 14. This definitely makes the case for OECS Unity, at least for an Economic Union. While St. Lucia has scored highest among the 6 States at #27, within the 10 categories, St. Vincent and the Grenadines scored #1 among the 175 countries surveyed in the category of Licensing of construction projects.

It was very clear from the findings of the survey that there is a lot to be done to get the States of our region to the position of being really attractive to international investors in relation to the ease of doing business in the OECS. The meeting was well attended by representatives of the contributing institutions and Officials of the private and public sectors. A passionate plea was made to donor countries to expand the study to include tourism and for funding to help to implement changes that will bring the countries up to the point where their ranking will be improved. This is the first time such a project has been undertaken in the OECS. You can check out the full details of the report at www.doingbusiness.org

This report is a document that governments should take serious note of and move swiftly to implement procedures that will remove existing hassles and make the region one that is welcoming to investors. IT IS ST. LUCIA'S TIME TO SHINE - CAN WE RISE BEYOND EXPECTATIONS???

It has been very hectic in the past few days shuttling between meetings during official working hours and evenings. However, it goes with the territory. The more meetings I attend, the more information I will be able to share with my readers and in my own way attempt to make recommendations that will help to accelerate initiatives.

It was very refreshing to learn from Sir K. Dwight Venner, Governor of the ECCB based in St. Kitts as he reported via a video conference held on January 18, 2007 on the ECCU Economic Review 2006 highlighting the economic performance of the OECS States. There were groups assembled across the sub-region and participants fielded questions which were answered by the Governor. The indicators prove that the economies continue to do well and the ECCB's position remains favourable.

Caribbean Development Bank/Inter-American Development Bank brought together Civil Society Organizations' Representatives from across the region for a three-day conference, February 22-24, 2007 which was held at the Bay Gardens Conference Centre. The theme was – Building Local Partnerships for Community Development. The feature address at the opening ceremony was delivered by The Right Honourable Sir John Compton, Prime Minister of St. Lucia and he noted that "development must be people oriented". It is very clear that the CDB and the IDB are seeking ways to empower communities and are working with Civil Society Organizations to ensure that programmes are put in place to achieve that objective.

Senator, Hon. Guy Mayers, Minister of Trade, Industry and Commerce was instrumental in convening a meeting for members of the private sector to meet officials of Cricket World Cup St. Lucia Ltd. on February 23, 2007 at the NIC Conference Room when Dr. Ernest Hilaire, Chief Executive Officer outlined his organization's role in the affairs of Cricket World Cup 2007 in St. Lucia. It was the Minister's first interaction with the Private Sector. The outcome of the meeting led me to the conclusion that the private sector armed with the information regarding the state of play with 47 days to go as of the date of the meeting had their work cut out for them.

The biggest challenge for St. Lucia is, to take care of 20,000 additional persons on island for 3-4 days for the Semi Final on 25/4/07. It is estimated that it will require inventory levels of 4-6 weeks to meet the demand for that period. Just for a while, try to picture what it will be like for those 3-4 days as the whole effort comes together. Arrivals, island transportation – land and sea, late shopping, entertainment programmes, garbage disposal, what an experience it will be. It is a great time to be alive as momentum builds up to the event. It should be everyone's prayer across the nine countries where the matches will be played that we the people will rise to the challenges and perform beyond expectations.

I feel that the Ministry of Trade, Industry and Commerce should convene a meeting of the key food and beverage distributors in the country to provide whatever assistance necessary so as to ensure that there is a commitment to meet the heightened demands during Cricket World Cup 2007. Hon. Edmund Estephane in the Ministry of Trade, Industry and Commerce has been given the responsibility to deal with the private sector in relation to matters of the CWC 2007. I recommend that distribution be decentralized wherever practicable and Retailers should be encouraged to increase their level of inventory substantially. The commercial banks should be extending some special facilities at this time.

Congratulations to President Colin Hunte and members of the Executive Committee which emerged from the elections at their AGM on February 24, 2007 at the Royal St. Lucian Hotel as they undertake the challenge to chart the course of the St. Lucia Hotel and Tourism Association (SLHTA) for the ensuing year. Senator, Hon. Allen Chastanet, newly appointed Minister of Tourism and Civil Aviation outlined his plans for the industry. There are a few challenges but given the energy that was visible at the meeting, it sends a clear signal that some exciting times are ahead. Airlift though a challenge, the Minister's willingness to take chances and operate outside of the box could well be the shot in the arm the industry is looking for. The rationalization of responsibilities of the various related organizations such as the Tourist Board and the Tourism Council is a first step. The Industry agencies are expected to be given the necessary financial support to ensure they deliver on their mandates. Soufriere with its World Heritage site seems to be in for some serious attention. The level of excitement at the meeting was so high that it was remarked by the Chairman of the proceedings that – the Wow Feeling is here!!!

The Minister of Trade, Industry and Commerce, Senator, Hon. Guy Mayers met with members of the Management Committee of the St. Lucia Industrial and Small Business Association (SLISBA) led by President – Patrick H. Joseph on February 24, 2007 in his office for almost two hours, and expressed his support for the Association. He remarked "that the Ministry will take a business approach to doing things and will seek to facilitate and not frustrate".

SLISBA is in the process of upgrading its Secretariat and has established relations with VIP Consultants, a French Consulting Company to assist in its institutional strengthening. The current management committee is committed to providing its membership with a level of service consistent with the demands of this new era.

The world is truly getting smaller and the internet is fueling that reality. I was interrupted last Wednesday with a call on my mobile phone which originated from the USA. The caller on the other side said that he was looking for commercial carpet but having checked the St. Lucia yellow pages and called a few companies listed without success, he continued his search which took him to my website – http://www.stluciarealtors.com and as a result called me. I told him to call back in 15 minutes and so he did. I was pleased to provide him with two sources. Two things were at work here, the power of the internet and providing service as promised. The slogan on my real estate website is "Tell us your needs, we bring the Experts together!"

As we approach Cricket World Cup 2007 there is going to be a lot of desperate last-minute calls and we must be geared to respond whether directly or indirectly and it is for this reason that the private sector associations need to bring their members together and get them to network and share information about their businesses. No one business will have the power to provide all the goods and services needed so the more we know about who has what, the better for all concerned. I am very uneasy with the level of supplies of goods and services that will be needed. Suddenly everyone will want to fix problems yesterday but where are the trained plumbers, carpenters, and other qualified tradesmen? Definitely, there is hardly enough to go around. The media and organizations like BOOST should be circulating information on service providers and sources of supplies so as to provide ready access.

In making my rounds this week, I visited Vieux Fort and had an opportunity to call on the Director of Worldwide Trade Partners Inc. which is based in the Goods Free Zone. This company occupies 70,000 square feet of space in 5 warehouses and offers a wide range of consumer products, including laundry and other household cleaning chemicals, canned foodstuffs, fruit juices, sanitary towels and disposable tableware, electrical appliances and electronic items. The company is sizing up distribution throughout the OECS sub region and Barbados for its range of products imported from the USA, Latin America and the Far East. Given the level of stocks in the company's warehouses, this is one source that local importers/distributors should seek to establish business relationship to secure their supplies at very competitive prices.

Just before commencing this article, I received in my mail box, the most recent Newsletter from Trade Watch, a publication of Caribbean Export Development Agency and this story caught my eyes: "BRAZIL TO GRANT FREE MARKET ACCESS TO LDC EXPORTS In early 2007, the Brazilian government will start granting duty – and quota – free market access to exports from 32 of the world's poorest countries, according to officials from Brasilia. This would make Brazil the first developing country to accord unimpeded access to goods from the 32 least developed countries (LDC) Members of the WTO.

Some Brazilian business groups are anxious about the effects of fully liberalizing all imports from LDCs. According to the analysis in the newspaper Valor Economico, companies from textiles, electronics, chemical, and machine equipment sectors are the most worried. Industry representatives have asked for some 1300 products to be designated as sensitive, while the government wants to accept no more than 900".

I am very impressed with the content of the Newsletter and take this opportunity recommend that you subscribe to it, at www.carib-export.com It's FREE!

I feel that manufacturers in the region rather than thinking about direct exports, wherever practicable should be thinking about collaborating with Brazilian manufacturers to produce their brand of products for the local distribution. This has nothing to do with whether St. Lucia is in the 32 LDCs or not but simply taking advantage of a window of opportunity whereby imported goods will enjoy the spotlight. However, if Brazil is a developing country, I see no reason why St. Lucia shouldn't be a LDC. More on this in a future article.

I was further heartened by the fact that the original programmes of OPSR are continuing. I encourage businesspersons to take advantage of the three types of interventions, Business Diagnostic, Business/Strategic Plan and Implementation. It is important for businesspersons to confirm to the business rules of engagement in today's world. A Business Plan is a vital document for guiding a business and when approaching financial institutions. This plan must be fresh in the Entrepreneur's mind and be updated on an annual basis.

There is too much stress in our environment and we are already paying the price with such illnesses as diabetes and hypertension, and broken marriages and relationships. There are too many bills to be paid. Money is the root cause of all of these problems. Initiatives to free up the financial market/services must be implemented. One Bank Official is on record as saying that the bank has long memory. That is not the way business is done. Ask Donald Trump? We must begin to look at failure in a different light. Some people are prepared for great success by previous failures.

Why is technology given a back seat? I am repeating my call for an Innovation and Technology Secretariat to initiate a serious entry into the world of technology where the internet is the engine of great fortunes. To prepare for this area of activity creative ways of funding these projects will have to be introduced so it is only the right level of financing that will see us through and ensure a place in the world of business for the small man.

As we celebrate our progress through the years and mark this period of celebration of our 28th Anniversary of Independence, let us pray for God's continued guidance and let every step we take be in His will.

UNDERSTANDING THE CULTURE OF THE PEOPLE WHERE YOU OPERATE IS VITAL TO BUSINESS SUCCESS!!!

Do not assume anything, get the proof before implementing your ideas. The Bible says prove all things, hold fast to that which is true. In today's world business is generally done by assumptions but successful businesses undertake surveys and research before making assumptions. Don't assume that the values of the recent past are the same today. Positive assumptions are based on facts.

Very often our political and business leaders arrive at assumptions without the relevant facts, ignoring the real facts on the ground. A good leader listens to the most insignificant person in their audience when attempting to arrive at a decision. Long ago it used to be stressed that the janitor in an organization can make suggestions that are important and cause the company to make significant gains financially or otherwise. It is said that a chain is as strong as its weakest link, therefore it is the weak link to say what can be done to make life easy for it and how it may be possible to utilize less pressure and get even significantly greater results. Leadership does not mean that the leader has to make all the decisions by himself.

There is a tendency in today's world whereby many say yes when they should be saying no and offering a different opinion. Some will refrain from making a contribution so as not to rock the boat only to say later that they know the project was destined to fail. The Caribbean is begging for stand-up leaders and followers. Sometimes, it seems as though there is so much wrong being perpetuated that should someone stand up and sound a dissenting voice there will be no organizations left. However, a way must be found because organizations are necessary to ensure order. Over the years, it is obvious that education does not provide leaders with better reasoning power and the tussle continues between those with book sense and those with commonsense.

Tolerance is important. People must begin to listen to each other even when one believes he/she already has the answer. No one person has exclusivity on knowledge. There is always room for improvement. Innovation is extended to taking an original idea or product and making it better.

Knowing the culture of the people you propose to lead and make decisions on their behalf is vital. In many instances leaders simply ignore the fundamental cultural implications and proceed to form their opinions and implement decisions without due consideration to the way the people conduct their businesses and their needs that will help to relieve the problem or afford them a springboard to achieve their goal in life.

As a leader your thoughts must take into consideration the height, the depth, the length and the width of the project or problem before arriving at a conclusion. In mediating you should not listen to only two sides of the story, there is also a third and some may argue there are even more sides to a coin, imaginary or real.

I have in a brief way spelled out the responsibilities of real leadership and I conclude by noting above all is EMPATHY. Do you feel the pain or the joy as the other person on whose behalf you are supposed to make a decision? You are a great leader only when your thoughts and actions are in harmony with those on whose behalf you make decisions. How will it impact their lives? Apply the Rotary's 4 Way Test. The one I like most is "Will it be beneficial to all concerned?" April 25, 2007 was the date on which the long-awaited 2nd Semi Final Match in the World Cup Cricket 2007 series was played. Yours truly was there to test the system and witness the match between Australia and South Africa which was won by the former. I guess that many who saw confusion and hitches of all types were surprised to witness the smooth execution of the day's activities. The traffic flowed, the people were well behaved and St. Lucians can proudly say that our people have the ability to deliver on their promise and exceed expectations.

Since my accident, I always check to see what arrangements are in place for physically challenged persons. On arrival at the Beausejour Cricket Ground, I noted that it was a little distance to the Stands and I promptly requested assistance to get there. After a few minutes, I was given a Golf Cart ride to the Gros Islet Stand where I spent most of the time in the Fans Tent networking and catching up on the politics of the moment, and the Budget.

I listened to most of the presentations of the Parliamentarians who had one hour to do so and, in some cases, extensions were sought. Has this new approach enhanced the debate? The debate was generally of a high standard, with few exceptions. If this system is going to be continued in the future, Members of Parliament will do well to receive some training from Toastmasters on the art of better listening, thinking and speaking and the ability to use eye contact, voice modulation and body language, and finally to stand up, speak up and shut up. In three months, one meeting per week of two hours duration will go a long way to enhance the quality of presentation by Parliamentarians. Toastmasters' Training produces Miracles in transforming fearful speakers to confident, dynamic speakers.

The Diplomatic maneuverings by China and Taiwan was put to rest in Hon. Rufus Bousquet, Minister of External Affairs, Internal Financial Services, Information and Broadcasting speech during the Budget debate. Taiwan will establish diplomatic relationship with St. Lucia.

The present Government led by Sir John Compton has its work cut out. The projects proposed seem to set an Agenda for the entire five-year term. St. Lucia can achieve substantial developments in the future as long as there is VISION and political will by the leadership. The Bible says young men dream dreams and old men see visions. The House of Parliament has a fair share of youth and experience to ensure the hopes and aspirations of the nation will be realized.

I was heartened to note that it was recognized by the Prime Minister in his presentation that the Private Sector is the Engine of Growth. It is time for the sector to be given the support it needs at the institutional level. The Associations serving the private sector must be strengthened to execute programmes on guidance and training to businesspersons. The promise of a Development Bank is welcomed but consultation with the stakeholders' associations should be undertaken before the final draft of the banks mode of operations decided upon. It is vital that the bank be established with a full understanding of the needs of the micro, small and medium enterprises. This is a special bank that should be established to meet the needs of its potential borrowers and their special circumstances. It should not operate as just another bank, it must be prepared to deal with risks. The rules of engagement have to be different.

The Budget has provided a blueprint which I hope is not set in stone and amendments could be made. It would be great if the people could be given an opportunity to discuss the Budget in town hall meetings. This would be a truly democratic approach and the people through this medium will be better informed and feel a part of the decision-making process.

On a closing note, while watching the 2nd CWC 2007Semi Final Match I saw something which struck me. All the players were slim. I feel it is time to stage one day matches for Obese people. It will give them an opportunity for another form of exercise. The wrestlers have a special category for the big boys. Think about it. Blind persons now play cricket. It is time for us to extend the possibilities for persons to get involved in the game.

It was an interesting week while the nation dealt with serious business, the party continues.

The St. Lucia CWC 2007 Local Organizing Committee delivered on its promise to produce a memorable world cup experience. Those skeptics who doubted the ability of the local organizers and the team of volunteers to deliver on their promises were shocked by the results and it is even more important to note that they delivered beyond expectations. I was blessed to watch the 2nd Semi Final at the Beausejour Cricket Ground on 25/4/07 and took a keen interest in looking at the organization on the ground. There is no doubt in my mind that the little island of St. Lucia has great minds and it was no accident that two sons of the soil made the Caribbean proud as they were awarded Nobel Laureates status. The island State itself gave the nation a World Heritage Site – the Pitons!

The Legacy of the West Indies winning the tournament was lost and it was a terrible thing to happen because for the next 4 years every time World Cup Cricket is mentioned, the West Indies team would have been mentioned as the 2007 winners. However, there is expected to be some residual benefits from the tournament, the impact from which is eagerly awaited. Most persons have concluded that the immediate impact on the economy was not equitably shared. I believe that the level of expectations that were shared with the people in the initial stage were unrealistic and as a result the debate on benefits derived will continue for a long time to come.

I am fully convinced that our leaders will have to enter into some future agreements collectively and the CWC 2007 experience must not be lost. How much better would it have been if the whole tournament was staged in Jamaica rather than hosted by nine nations? Every country could have been given an economic stake with the hosting of Caribbean Villages at all major venues where matches would have been played in the sole country – Jamaica. This could be a lesson for the next time such an opportunity presents itself.

Too many times when Caribbean leaders are given a real opportunity to unite, they put country's interest first. We have seen it in almost every instance. It is the same with the naming of a West Indies cricket team, each country must have representation or else there is threat of boycott of attendance at matches. We have to move on from Nationalism to Regionalism or continue to be losers. Lara has moved on. He should have done so many moons ago but it is all politics. We continue to be plagued with the demon that because a person is the best at what he or she does and even earn the highest remuneration in the group, that person must be given the leadership, regardless. Let us revisit Peter Drucker's definition of Management which states that "Management is a social process which entails the mobilization of human resources for a common objective". It is the person who has the ability to lead who should be given the leadership of the sports team or the business and those you are given leadership because of their inter personal skills should not necessarily be paid the highest remuneration.

West Indies cricket is at cross roads. The question is which way to go? A hard look at the situation tells me that the level of indiscipline in the team at this juncture needs a brand-new team. Forget the experiences of those who are supposed to be experienced and only bring their fans shame, primarily because of their indiscipline and lack of respect for their fans. On the other hand, the person in whose hands the responsibility for captaincy of the team will be placed should be appointed in keeping with the Drucker's definition of management.

The time has come for the West Indies Board to talk the talk and walk the walk of Caribbean Unity and replace Nationalism with Regionalism. It is easier said than done but someone has to bite the bullet and do what is right. If it takes a touch of righteousness in the team to get all the players to be counseled by the best in their religion and employ the best Motivational coach in the world, so be it. There must be a spiritual and emotional awakening of the region's cricketers. The fans in the region have given their hearts, it is time that the cricketers give back something and all that is needed is greater commitment to the game.

St. Lucia has moved on and is now ready to be host for St. Lucia Jazz 2007 which is scheduled for the period May 4 - 13, 2007. Ten days of fun in the sun and music under the stars. Check out the happenings at: http://www.stluciajazz.org

# #66 PERSONS WITH QUALIFICATIONS BY EXPERIENCE NEED TO BE INVOLVED AT ALL LEVELS OF ENDEAVOUR IN THE ST. LUCIAN SOCIETY!

PERSONS WITH QUALIFICATIONS BY EXPERIENCE NEED TO BE INVOLVED AT ALL LEVELS OF ENDEAVOUR IN THE ST. LUCIAN SOCIETY!

A few months ago, I was imbibing with some of my friends in a popular local bar and for the first time I heard about QBEs, and I hastened to find out the meaning of the abbreviation. I was told that it stands for Qualification By Experience. I am a believer in such persons because on occasions when I wear the hat of an employer, I see persons without formal education outperform many who were otherwise qualified.

An employer's best asset is to find someone who is qualified by experience as the employee will continuously be on a crusade to justify his/her appointment. People without formal qualifications work harder and are more conscientious seeking to express gratitude at all times for the opportunity that was afforded them by the employer. However, the employer must be smart enough not to exploit such employees by giving in return poor wages and conditions of work.

It has been noted over and over again that QBEs are pushed aside in favour of PhDs at substantial loss to the employer be it in the Private or Public Sector. Mistakes can be costly and it is always better to avoid trial and error. In the Caribbean there are very few situations where fully qualified persons serve a period of apprenticeship. Once a person passes through university and is qualified/specialized in a particular field, there is seldom a period of apprenticeship in the region, a situation which is sometimes caused by shortage of manpower. Once the opening matches the person's university qualifications, it is OK. Many instances, the person recruited has no passion for what he or she is asked to do. Many times, inter action with officials in their various offices leave much to be desired. It is all because of a lack of passion. The person must fit the role, not the role fitting the qualifications. It is very obvious these days that Vacancy Advertisements are very specific and seldom carry the line after noting the university qualifications – "or persons with related job experiences may apply". In the past that line was intended for QBEs.

Another situation which is common is employers recruiting persons who are over qualified for jobs which in many instances, the persons are just holding on until the right job comes along. This situation sets up employees to frustrate the persons whom they are recruited to serve. Customer satisfaction can only be guaranteed when employees are committed to service and are passionate about their jobs. It is a win -win situation when an employer is able to spot an employee who has the experience and seeks to grasp an opportunity that affords upward mobility. Give me a QBE who is passionate about the assignment being offered any day.

We have associations for all types of professions, isn't time we have an Association for QBEs??? This could be one way of providing the street smarts and practical know how to the newly qualified professionals. It is time for those with the knowledge of doing things right the first time to document their findings and place them in the public domain even it has to be at a fee, just do it and leave it as a legacy to the nation.

I was having a conversation with myself recently and my thoughts took me on a Caribbean journey to re acquaint myself with the herbs and barks and other medicinal trees and plants in the region. I asked the question aloud – why can't we develop a commercial line of herbal medicines for our peoples and the rest of the world? In spite of the stringent standards set for drugs by the FDA in the USA, herbal products in the USA are allowed a free pass for local and export consumption while all types of red tapes are placed on similar imported products. It is time that we free up the system and allow the QBEs to do what they have proven over the years to work and rid our people from diabetes, hypertension, various colds, prostate, etc, etc. I am reliably informed that there are herbal cures for all types of common diseases in the region but our QBEs are not given a real opportunity to produce and market their products commercially.

I am seeing a need for Research and Development Agencies to be established to bring products to the fore to be commercialized. Do we expand the role of the existing Bureau of Standards? The time has come for our Government to look in the direction of wealth creation through facilitation of innovation and technology including R & D to advance the economic base of our country. The National Development Corporation should play a greater role in channeling investments in certain areas consistent with the needs of the country. Everyone is concerned about the way forward for St. Lucia. The big question is – how can we put idle hands to work? It is argued that crime is directly related to poverty and poverty is a consequence of lack of employment opportunities. In planning the attack on poverty, the QBEs should be called in to discuss how they can put 5,000 jobs on the market each year for the next five years.

In my last article, I referred to a gentleman who is seeking to establish a World Humanitarian Bank with the opportunity for individuals to deposit their skills and they will be called upon to respond to various projects from time to time. I asked him if Caribbean QBEs and experts could participate and he answered in the affirmative. I will be sharing the good news with you as soon as it is available. I am hopeful that Chapters would be established in various regions of the world including the Caribbean as we seem to work best with international organizations.

IS IT A TIME OF GREAT UNCERTAINTY OR GREAT OPPORTUNITY???

This past week the Caribbean got a window of opportunity to state its case to the most powerful man in the world. Did our leaders make good use of it? Or was it just another wasted opportunity? What are my expectations? A return to normalcy in relations as it used to be and the U.S.A.I.D offices strengthened throughout the region to deliver the much-needed assistance to implement the projects that will be mutually beneficial to our nations and the USA.

The Conference on the Caribbean opened up an opportunity for a special kind of dialogue and the agenda promised much. A special agenda item struck me. It is the involvement of the Diaspora in our future development. The Caribbean has professionals in every conceivable area of professional and business endeavor but do they ever embrace their homeland or their region. Many of them are quick to write off the region stating that their discipline is too advanced to be practiced in the Caribbean. Those who hold that view are wrong, given the level of donor agency funding and the ability of our leaders to raise financing as was demonstrated in the recent Cricket World Cup 2007.

I am convinced that most things are possible, given the political will. The region needs a proper forensic laboratory. We have the professionals abroad who can operate such an institution. We are all concerned about crime and its impact upon our economic survival. What prevents us from moving forward with the urgency such a programme deserves?

However, businesspersons and professionals like everyone else needs to be wooed into doing things, even making a contribution to the country of their birth or their region. Express your needs to your own first, then to the world. Put your own to work for you. It is for this very reason that I promoted the idea of Trade and Tourism Representatives around the world. It is the simple things that are being ignored. What is freely available, we are prepared to pay for and receive a lesser value of service without any passion. When love of country is in play, in any positive intervention, it yields far beyond reasonable expectation.

The regional development agencies are doing their best to ensure that the available grant funding to the region is effectively utilized and number of workshops on Strategic Planning and Proposal Writing are being hosted in the OECS sub region. For the first time in all my years of attending training programmes, I received a programme outline that offers apart from the two days of intensive training, follow up assistance from the Consultant and an internet support site to refer to from time to time. Things are definitely improving and Consultants have come to the realization that workshop presentations need follow up. We are likely to see with the new cooperation beyond the training room, open up opportunities for actual consulting relationships with persons who were trained.

There is also a missing link in most conferences where when the conference is over everyone goes back to their base and nothing happens until the next time. In between meetings, courses, etc. there should be some degree of communication to follow up on progress based on the new method learned. We lack this very important ingredient that will add value to exposures gained. It is time for persons who are given opportunities to gain valuable exposure in industry or profession to find means of sharing the experiences. We see very little exchange between foreign and local Consultants. I feel that collaboration should be encouraged and a local counterpart should be appointed whenever possible. There should be more training for the trainers' opportunities where in principle those who learn in the first instance will teach others. The time has come for us to change our approach to several of the ways we do things so as to ensure that we get more from every possible intervention where the story can be told to others for the advancement of our country. After all, it is only when we share that we show we care.

In a period of uncertainty, those who chose to see opportunities will be big winners when stability returns. Apply the principle of an aircraft pilot when he hits turbulence at 35,000 feet, he buckles up his seat belt and just keep on flying. Before you can recognize that you were in a serious spot of turbulence, you hear the captain with assuring words, we are now cleared and the ride is expected to fine for the duration of the flight.

The party is over. Carnival from all reports was a success. The intermittent rain did not stop the fun. It is always a good thing to take a break from the rigors of work. Now, it is time to get back to serious business. What is next in the party line up?

While everyone was partying and jumping in the streets, I discovered during a visit to one of the banks that purchasers of land can acquire land with 100% mortgages. It can't be any easier for potential property owners. There is always the uneasiness that foreigners are buying up all the land. Some have even suggested that there be some form of control by Government. However, in today's world Government's protection or legislation in favour of nationals is just not on the cards. National Status is for everyone, alien or national.

He who owns the land owns the country. Large property acquisitions will continue to flow from direct foreign investments but there is a place for citizens to acquire their piece of the rock. There should be an aggressive promotion of land co-operatives. The need for the opening up of new lands by providing the seed money to do the infrastructure is great. Is there any institution ready to advance funds to develop new lands around the country? It is necessary for our banking institution to look in the areas of creative lending that will impact on development.

As the WTO rules take root, it will not only be land, it will be investments, jobs and freedom of travel. Already Real Estate Agents are complaining about foreigners being allowed to operate freely in St. Lucia but it is argued by some that the market has changed and the foreign Realtors have access to the markets where the buyers of condos and villas are located. While there has been an expansion in up market properties, the form of investment has not attracted locals, even when special incentives are offered to locals. Buying at preconstruction could yield a return several times more than the investment return in financial institutions.

The great Dow Jones and other Wall Street Trading Houses are what they are because of investors coming together to acquire shares and providing massive amounts of capital for companies to grow and prosper. It is time that incentives be given to companies to go public so that our citizens can begin to develop an investment culture. Recent stock offers have proven that our people are not unwilling to invest but there needs to be more opportunities.

The companies that offer special investment instruments must find more effective ways of informing and educating the masses. It must be borne in mind that it is not only the locals that will be targeted but also the Diaspora as relatives in St. Lucia share their knowledge with those overseas. The efforts made at reaching out to the communities, all be it at a certain level do not provide a wide enough representation. Radio and television should be included in any effective programme that seeks to inform and educate. There needs to be a partnership between the media and individuals/agencies that have ideas and information to share.

While the profit motive is the driving force to sustain and expand businesses, I am convinced that the element of risk makes the real difference between ordinary and phenomenal success. We must come together and develop some 21st century mechanisms to meet those needs which have been neglected in the past. Lending to small businesses needs special consideration. The time has come to find real solutions to dealing with this issue that can made a dent into the unemployment situation in the country.

There is definitely a willingness to break away from the methods that are no longer applicable but it is too slow. Change must come swiftly as the solutions in many instances have been for a long time, just ideas.

Sir Walter Raleigh was in search of a destination that produced gold. Today's explorers are looking for Investment Destinations that offer incentives and lifestyles in a hassle-free environment.

The recent held 3-day investment conference, July 23-25, 2007 which brought together Investors from the major multilateral investment agencies and the principal lending institutions, included a wide range of traditional donor agencies representatives from the World Bank, the European Union [EU] and the Caribbean Development Bank [CDB] as well as major private regional and international investors such as Royal and Carnival Cruise Lines and international hotel chains. This event must give impetus to the investment and development programmes proposed by the government in the recent Budget presentation.

The ailing Prime Minister, The Right Honourable, Sir John Compton could not resist being present at the signing ceremony when the Government agreed to extending its agreement with Hess Corporation. A promise was made at the signing to construct a seven Billion Dollar state of the art oil refinery. This was a long outstanding issue as the first agreement had a commitment to construction a refinery that was never materialized. However, this time it was indicated that Hess Corporation will be seeking a partner to implement to project.

Today in St. Lucia, we no longer speak in terms of Millions, instead we now speak of Billions. There is definitely going to be the need for Billions of dollars to be invested in infrastructural development if the country is to position itself to respond to the investment flows that are anticipated. The development of the Cul de Sac Port, the modernization of the City of Castries and the tunneling of Barre D' Lisle. These are significant developments and the price tag could be considerable.

It is said that the conference emerged out of Sir John's concerns about the growing phenomenon of increasing poverty in Saint Lucia over the past decade and the disparities in development between the northern part of Saint Lucia and other areas in the country. No one can ignore this fact that in spite of the infrastructural development in South of the island which has been dubbed the New Frontier, no serious investment has been made in the area. Things are about to change with the construction of the Le Paradis property in the Praslin area on the East Coast which is currently taking place and the much anticipated Ritz Carlton Hotel supposed to be built in the Black Bay area in the South, a few minutes from the Hewanorra International Airport in Vieux Fort.

The recently held Conference on the Caribbean in Washington was timely. The plea made to members of the Diaspora to return and help in the development of their homeland has to be taken seriously and initiatives must begin to seriously promote such a programme. St. Lucia must begin to train its people to develop a pool of skills consistent with the economic explosion that is possible with the next two to three years. There is also the need for the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise operators to be sensitized to the need for new goods and services that will be needed to adequately meet the demands of the proposed new industries. This process must begin now.

It is my view if a serious approach is to be taken to putting idle hands to work, training must be a significant ingredient. This step in itself is a massive undertaking and needs planning. This is going to be an opportunity for all sectors of the economy to work together and will necessitate a greater role for the National Skills Development Centre.

It is all coming together now. The years of hard work by the Investment Promotion Professionals in the overseas divisions of the National Development Corporation is about to pay off. Our governments over the years have stayed the course and opportunities will continue to open up. The road to prosperity has just been strengthened and the builders must emerge without any wavering. This is no time for doubting, it is time to make good of the opportunity. It is harvest time and those of us who shared the optimism and truly believed in the virtues of our island state can celebrate.

IS THE PRICE OF MODERNISATION TOO MUCH TO BEAR?????

Amidst the general anxieties and uncertainties of everyday life in today's St. Lucia there are too many obstacles in the way of progress. Or is this the price we must pay for progress? The road development that is currently being undertaken is a nightmare. Could anyone calculate the loss of man hours as a result of the traffic congestion that has been the daily routine for almost a year?

Who would have imagined such chaos? Have we bitten off more than we can chew? I am finding it difficult to see the real value of the road improvement. Those of us who attended the various briefing sessions prior to the commencement of construction must be totally dissatisfied with the state of affairs as they are today. Up to now I cannot understand if we are going to end up with a one, two, three or four lane highway. We just have to wait and see. The MEDIAN thing, the thing in the middle is a vexation to my spirit when it takes me twice the time to get to my destination. Gas consumption will increase. When will the construction works really end? It is said no pain, no gain but the pain is becoming unbearable.

There are too many hassles affecting our already complicated lives. I wonder if all this is not affecting businesses, especially the frustrations of getting to and from work. Some drivers are already suffering from road rage as is evidenced many times on the roads when drivers simply burst through the traffic hoping that nothing will be in their way. Then there is the quality of roads being built. The East Coast Highway with its heavy traffic as a result of major construction works is going to wear very fast. Roads works will continue to be a major expense in the years ahead.

As if the road blues are not enough. Have you tried transacting business in a bank recently? In an attempt to woo customers a few years ago, banks offered payroll services and most employers embraced it. So now employees get time off to go down to the banks to collect their salaries and wages. This was very convenient as it reduced the risk of large amounts of cash being on companies' premises. That went well for a time but with the construction boom it all went up in smoke. Transacting business at a Bank has become nothing but a hassle. Corporate clients must be accommodated outside of the normal lines and old people must get a dedicated line as the current situation will cause many to die from frustration that will cause further stress and increase the level of their hypertension. Where there is provision for old people, the facility is being extended to others like uniformed personnel, pregnant mothers, etc. Grey hair retirees bending on a stick must be given priority. To improve the service to aging citizens the dedicated line must be supervised and when grey headed old people approach the line, they must be upgraded, not simply join the line. Every bank must have a dedicated line for old people and handicapped. I will qualify for both. I do have a self-interest in all this but I believe someone has to make the case. I am forced to make this point after visiting the bank three times in two days to effect change of signatures for an organization. I had to be first at the bank door upon opening on the second day. That did take getting out of bed much earlier than my normal time.

While we have to cope with making ends meet and the hassles of using the highways and sorting out our few pennies in the banks, stress is eating away at us. We are quite aware of the health issues affecting us in St. Lucia and it all has to do with our eating habits but no businessperson is making an attempt to tap into that market. Could some unemployed persons prepare salads and distribute to offices? That could be a big small business for many operating from their homes. There should be a law that every restaurant carries a salad bar. The health of our people must be given some priority.

I know my readers expect me to write on the SLISBA issue which is being publicized in the media. I am sorry to disappoint you. All I wish to note is that SLISBA had a great month of activities which was well supported. The organization has achieved a level of success that its leadership is worth fighting for. One of the Entrepreneurs at the meeting was involved in many businesses including Construction, Real Estate Development, Super Market, Lawn Care, among others. Though they were all successful, he saw the need to consolidate and continue to be involved in only two of the several businesses he was involved with. The two businesses selected for future involvement are Lawn Care and Real Estate Development.

While the issue of availability of labour did not come up at the meeting, every discussion I held with Entrepreneurs, the subject of labour came up. Very soon it appears as though Trinidad and Tobago will have to remove work permit restrictions and open up the country to workers from the region and beyond. The labour market is contracting while the economy is expanding and as a result there is the need for an expanded work force. The work ethic in T & T in most industries is outright nonproductive. Very soon it will be more attractive for CARICOM Nationals to go to T & T instead of the USA, Canada and England where until now are the destinations of choice. However, very soon a workers' paradise will be found in T & T.

The just concluded elections gave the Manning Government another term in office with an increase of one in Parliament. Immediately after elections, the newly elected members on the Government side went into retreat. This was necessary as many of the Ministers were new kids on the block and a period of orientation was needed. Many people were still celebrating the PNM victory and for a moment it seemed that all of Trinidad and Tobago was united behind their Government. The third party led by a former Finance Minister of the UNC failed to gain a seat, in spite of it gaining a substantial number of votes. It seemed that when crunch time came, the majority of voters stuck to their old ways and voted for Manning and Panday.

What I was hearing in Trinidad was not so much discussion about politics, it was about business expansion. Opportunities abound in T & T. Labour is at a premium. There should be good business for Employment Agencies. What does all this mean to the Entrepreneurs of the Region? There is no better time to invest cross border in the CSM than now. Whether you are in manufacturing or services, don't export, establish! Take some of your skilled personnel with you and invoke your right of establishment. There is money to be made in Trinidad and Tobago. Leverage your experiences and get into joint ventures. Your knowledge of the industry you are engaged in can get you established in T & T without substantial investment on your part through the joint venture route. If you feel confident enough, go ahead and get a piece of the pie.

The price of oil is expected to level off at US\$100.00 per barrel. As a result, cost of living will rise substantially throughout the region, it will take increased level of income at all levels of our existence. Demand for increased wages will be the story of 2008. With cost of living rising, sales of certain products are likely to decline as consumers apply restraint in how they spend their money. The obvious decision is to expand into markets where the economy is booming and consumers are spending freely. I now know for a fact that the Trinidadians are coming. What are we waiting for?

Skills Training should be a priority at this time as we seek to satisfy our regional labour market and reduce unemployment. Entrepreneurial skills can aid the process. Salesmanship should be thought in schools. I was introduced to a number of MLM opportunities during my brief stay in Trinidad. One of the busiest booths was the 4Life MLMers booth. They were smiling all the time and doing lots of business. Check out what was keeping the men and women in that booth smiling at http://www.4life.com

I am happy for the experience gained in T & T and it reinforces many of the positions I have taken in this column. Don't be afraid to venture outside of your comfort zone. If you have an idea, check it out and if you are confident that there is a demand for your idea, move to the next level and implement it.

I am very concerned about the latter statement as this comes from someone who must know what he is talking about. That statement hits at the very core of confidence in the industry and by extension the agricultural sector. It leaves me to wonder if the two pronouncements are linked in any way. However, I am happy to note that on the issue of the importation of food our professionals have totally debunked that idea. My take is that FOOD SECURITY must be at the heart of every Government's agenda.

Too often we are ready to turn our backs on industries that have been important in our early development and even ignore markets within our reach. We must begin to take cognizance of our environment and take decisions that will be in our best interests. It was very much the same in tourism until someone woke up to the reality that people of the region are also potential tourists. It is the same story with Bananas where we are now waking up to the reality the there is a market in the region for Plantains and Bananas. People who discourage activities in the agricultural sector must not be allowed to change our mind set about the relevance of agriculture in our country/region. I am fully persuaded that every country in the region should keep its agricultural base alive. With the cost of living spiraling, we must return to basics, kitchen gardens and rearing of animals and poultry should occupy the free time of households.

As the deadline approached on the EU-Cariforum Economic Partnership Agreement (EPA) our Governments have signed on. In the final analysis there had to be compromise on both sides. Congratulations to Minister Guy Mayers and his team for a job well done in the circumstances. What are we to do now? I believe that while the negotiations were taking place, parallel discussions if not workshops should have been convened on a regular basis to look at implementing the EPA in an attempt to get the most out of the programmes. Implementation is set for April 19, 2008. In the meantime, the governments of the region are expected to put the necessary legislative framework in place. Check out the Press release at http://www.stlucia.gov.lc It is interesting to note that while everyone was ready to walk away from Bananas, the fruit unlike Sugar and Rice which were only given an extension of protection for two years, will be allowed into Europe - Duty Free, Quota Free without restrictions. I have been reporting to you on the level of investments taking place in St. Lucia which will continue for at least another two years. On the other hand, the Government is forging ahead with some strategic development plans. I posted on my website some details on the EPA and other trade matters. WAIVER OF CUSTOMS LEVIES ON MLM WELLNESS PRODUCTS CAN REDUCE UNEMPLOYMENT SUBSTANTIALLY!

GOVERNMENT CAN REDUCE UNEMPLOYMENT SUBSTANTIALLY WITH THE REMOVAL OF CUSTOMS LEVIES ON WELLNESS PRODUCTS OFFERED BY REPUTABLE MLM COMPANIES!

I have made this point on several occasions in my column that Governments around the region can make a serious dent in the unemployment situation in their countries if Multi-Level Marketing / Network Marketing is encouraged. In St. Lucia like all the other countries in the region our people need to be motivated. The expansion of the MLM Industry is one approach to motivating people to be the best they can. The MLM business thrives on Motivation for Action.

MLM is the only business that is available to anyone who has a burning desire to acquire financial and time freedom, regardless of age, experience, education, financial resources, social or business connections, religion or race. It is the only business that can turn dreams into reality and provide its participants with the ability to do whatever they want, whenever they wish, without worrying about the cost or availability of time. This is the dream of most of us. Today, around the world, many persons are living their dream.

MLM is based on specialized training which is targeted towards teaching persons to open doors and secure business. The principles taught in the training programmes provide very important values to latch unto in life. Everyone needs to be a sales person as we compete for jobs, promotions or even social interactions. The art of effective communication is at the core of MLM training.

As the MLM business sweeps across the nation, training will be available to all persons who enroll in the various programmes. The Barbadians have been introducing MLM programmes to St. Lucians for as long as I can remember. The last Amway presentation I attended, it was the Barbadians who were the region's leaders. Amway is now Quixtar and those persons who have been involved over the years have become believers and many continue to do well and enjoy incentives such as cruises, subsidized conference attendance. I must hasten to add that MLM is not only about selling products, like Vitamins, Cosmetics, Dish Washing Liquids, Tooth Paste, etc. Some MLM Companies offer service/training programmes that are marketed electronically.

Action on the part of the Government is urgently needed to apply a Waiver of Customs Levy on selected MLM products, especially in the Wellness Category at least for one year initially. Thereafter, the programme can be assessed for its contribution to the nation in terms of employment generation and health care. There is no way that the MLM business can thrive in St. Lucia or anywhere else in the region with the level of Custom Levies currently applied. A Customs Broker informed me that the current Customs Levies on Nutritional Products are: Duty – 35% on cost of product plus freight, Consumption Tax – 15%, Customs Service Charge 5%. This level of Customs Charges negatively affects the selling prices of MLM products. The failure of many companies to survive in the market is due this single factor. As a result, our people are denied access to the products. In many instances they were experiencing relief from their illnesses but the products are no longer available on the market.

It is well known that some of the most effective products to be introduced to consumers in recent years have been done through the MLM Industry. The MLM Industry is such an effective means of distributing products that the telecommunication, insurance and other industries are using this method of reaching potential customers. It is primary a system that is promoted by word of mouth introduction and direct selling contact.

The current economic realities will bring on and, in some cases, aggravate the health problems of many as they grapple to sustain a reasonable level of business and family commitments. STRESS is going to be the number one health problem in St. Lucia and will trigger Diabetes and Hypertension which already have their toll on our citizens. What can be done to help stave off as much as possible the STRESS condition and likely associated health problems? To help deal with the potential health problems, action in addressing the negative impact of Customs Levies on Wellness Products is urgently needed.

The solution to the high cost of doing business and living is to increase income. There is the need for businesspersons to find ways of identifying and engaging in Multiple Sources of Income and those who are employed, a second and third source of income. MLM offers the opportunity for many to find their own source of employment and be self-employed.

In my capacity as Chairman of the Steering Committee of the Realtors' Association, I had the privilege of being involved with a 3 Day Beginner's Course for Real Estate Agents and persons with an interest in the real estate industry. It was a success and now we are planning a programme for persons in the South and West Corridor of the island. This Course was developed to educate and inform persons involved in the Real Estate Industry and to attract new entrants.

Many businesspersons whose businesses rely upon their presence in their businesses will suffer greatly if they fall ill for an extended period. Residual income should be a priority of today's Entrepreneur.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (CSR) GOES FAST TRACK IN 2008

Everyone is trying to invent a MAGIC WAND that will alleviate poverty and control crime but I have learnt that a journey of a thousand miles begins with the first step. I have also learnt that if you wish to achieve massive success set yourself small achievable goals that will lead to your main overachieving GOAL.

A lot of things have been said about CSR but I have come to the conclusion that CSR can reduce poverty and give hope the citizens that will afford them a better quality of life, one step at a time.

CSR strikes at the core values of an organization. It is the employer's responsibility to provide a work environment that employer and employees can be proud. I am proud to be an employee working at John Jones and company. My employer cares for and shares with not only the staff but also with the community. That leads to the next phase of CSR your responsibility to the community in which you operate. Are you one of those business persons who ignore the needs of their community even though the company is in a position to help? Finally, taking care of the environment is essential in these days, especially when most of our island States depend on tourism for their survival. Are you a hostile polluter????

After such an opening where employees and community are demanding that companies seek to be true corporate citizens, I hasten to provide a Caribbean definition of CSR. This definition emerged from a 3-day workshop held in Barbados, November 26-29, 2007: "CSR is a strategic process and commitment to achieve sustainable development (social, cultural, economical and environmental) through partnerships with all stakeholders".

#### Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) in Action:

CSR is a concept, which encourages organizations to consider the interests of society by taking responsibility for the impact of the organization's activities on customers, employees, shareholders, communities and the environment in all aspects of its operations. This obligation is seen to extend beyond the statutory obligation to comply with legislation and sees organizations voluntarily taking further steps to improve the quality of life for employees and families as well as for the local community and society at large.

#### Major Objective of the Promoters of the CSR Program

The goal of the promoters of CSR is to work with all stakeholders to encourage business practices that would help ensure successful and profitable business that contribute fully to achieving our sustainable development goals.

#### Some thoughts on CSR

There is no universally accepted definition of CSR. Selected definitions by CSR organizations and actors include:

- "Corporate Social Responsibility is the continuing commitment by business to behave ethically and contribute to economic development while improving the quality of life of the workforce and their families as well as of the local community and society at large" World Business Councils for Sustainable Development"
- CSR is about how companies manage the business processes to produce an overall positive impact on society."
- "CSR is a company's commitment to operating in an economically, socially and environmentally sustainable manner whilst balancing the interest of diverse stakeholders."
- A concept whereby companies integrate social and environmental concerns in their business operations and in their interaction with their stakeholders on a voluntary basis."
- "There is one and only one social responsibility of business to use its resources and engage in activities designed to increase its profits so long as it stays within the rules of the game, which is to say, engages in open and free competition without deception or fraud. CSR goes beyond such thinking.

Approaches to CSR

Internal Company Responsibilities for CSR:

- \*Proper waste disposable practices
- \*Select environmentally friendly materials for office/factory use
- \*Implement and enforce sound health and safety practices (ergonomic furniture and accessories etc.)
- \*Install energy-saving devices
- \*Encourage volunteerism and social equitable interaction among staff (reward, etc.)
- \*Provide continuous training, evaluation, and monitoring re: CSR activities, objectivities and issues
- \*Foster high employee morale by building relationships and partnerships to alleviate perceived employee hardship. (Day-care Provision, Flex-time, Gym membership etc.)
- \*Ensure that operational systems are user-friendly
- \*Integrate CSR policy as part of company business and HR planning.

#### External Company Responsibility for CSR:

- \*Research/disseminate information on worthwhile social programs
- \*Voluntarily contribute in kind/cash to programs/events that impacting on company and country development goals
- \*Promote company's CSR philosophy and strategies via media, websites, newsletter etc.
- \*Comply with all relevant government labor, health and safety regulations
- \*Provide environmental customer-friendly packaging etc.
- \*Encourage special programs and events for customers in promotion of CSR (Customer appreciation day, giveaways, etc. \*Inhibit customer-friendly building/infrastructure \*Establish, monitor and evaluate customer service code of conduct \*Support principles and legislation that promote socially responsibility issues such as human rights, equal opportunity, disability and children's right. \*Reward stakeholders, companies and children's right.

Every company should aspire to achieving these fundamental goals of CSR for the benefit of their community and nation as a whole. The time for CHANGE is now! Not only in the USA, but everywhere! St. Lucia must play an integral participating role in CSR.

A small committee comprising of persons who participated in the two CSR workshops held in Trinidad and Barbados in 2007 is at work and it will host a special meeting on Friday, 15th February, 2008 at the Auberge Seraphine Conference Room at 10.00am to sensitize stakeholders on developments that have taken place so far and lay out plans for the future. St. Lucia is one of five countries in the region that has been selected in the pilot project. The SBCI Group comprises of Architects, Engineers, Professors, Consultants, Specialists in environmental issues including renewable energy, and Suppliers of essential Building Materials – CEMEX and ArcelorMittal. Papers were presented by representatives of the Think Tank on Climate Change and the Think Tank on Bench Marking and the Policy and Tools Working Group. Discussions relating to low cost energy efficient buildings and a round table on establishing a regional action plan for sustainable building and construction in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Hon. Richard Fredericks, Minister for Physical Development, Housing, Urban Renewal and Local Government led a delegation comprising of the Mayor of Castries, His Worship, Irving John and other officials of the Ministry of Housing, City Council and Housing Corporation. The Honourable Minister addressed the gathering on Friday, 11/4/08. His speech was well received by the delegates. He drew attention to St. Lucia's efforts in the area of Sustainable Building and Construction and his desire to see all the citizens of St. Lucia properly housed. He mentioned the plight of some of the residents in his constituency and made reference to conditions in the Grave Yard, Conway and other areas and gave a commitment to ensure that the housing problems in those areas are arrested.

A number of activities were held to ensure that networking was possible and persons were forming lines to speak with the Minister. Entrepreneurs involved in low cost housing and fish processing expressed interest in St. Lucia.

A bus tour and site visit on Saturday, 12/4/08 exposed delegates to the social housing – high rise buildings which are commonly used in Martinique. A concept which is yet to be introduced in St. Lucia although the CDC and NHC buildings are the closest we get to such affordable housing schemes.

Ms. Maguy Marie-Jeanne, Head of Department, International Relations and Cooperation Affairs, Regional Council of Martinique and Mr. Lesley Blinker, Consultant – Monplaisir Group did everything possible to ensure that the delegates got a memorable experience.

I am hopeful that because of the composition of the delegates based on their direct involvement in all aspects of sustainable building and construction, the conference will deliver tangible benefits to the participants and their organizations. My search for sustainable low-cost housing has taken me to Cuba, Jamaica, Venezuela and Guyana and although at one time, the company I was associated with actually built two model houses based on Cuban technology, they did not appeal to local property seekers. Over the next few days, I will be in touch with the several delegates who are in a position to put me in touch with Designers and Suppliers of low-cost sustainable houses.

At one of the evening programmes, I met a gentleman who is in the construction business and he provided me with drawings for a system he is offering that provide all types of buildings including residential types. As negotiations progress with local developers my readers will be kept informed.

#### **EDWARD HARRIS AT LARGE!**

Profiling Economic Vulnerability and Economic Resilience in Small States – The case of St. Lucia!

I take this opportunity to share with my readers the text of a presentation I made to the participants of a workshop recently.

Text: It is indeed a privilege and a pleasure to be in the company of such a distinguished gathering seeking to find solutions to the challenges that face small and vulnerable States.

I am very pleased to note the work of the Commonwealth Secretariat around the Commonwealth and particularly in our region. This is the second conference I am attending in the past month sponsored by the Commonwealth Secretariat. The first being SME Workshop held on May 27 & 28, 2008. which provided participants with the opportunity to discuss solutions to challenges facing SMEs in the Caribbean.

I wish to commend at the very outset, the Coordinators of this conference for setting out clearly the objectives and general direction of this Conference.

I am humbled by the task given me here this morning to deliver one of two keynote speeches on "Different Aspects of Economic Development in St. Lucia". It will be very easy for me to direct you to the Government's Website at www.stlucia.gov.lc and suggest that you review the link on Economic & Social Review.

#### THE PRODUCTIVE SECTORS:

Up to the late 90s, the Banana Industry was the economic mainstay of our island. We awakened to a new reality at the dawn of the first decade of the 21st Century – the challenges of the WTO and a signal from the European Union that preferential treatment of the Windward Islands Bananas will soon be a thing of the past and Open Access would be introduced. We were challenged to heed the call which was echoed for several years to diversify Agriculture and also to diversify our economy.

#### TOURISM:

We saw less reliance being placed on Agriculture and greater emphasis being placed on Tourism and Manufacturing by our Government. Services became the new Buzz Word. Fortunately for St. Lucia diversification into Tourism came easily. Investors were rushing to the new frontier. The government of the day spared no time in adjusting its Fiscal Incentives Regime to reflect the seriousness of the times. Everything was done to encourage investors, and they came and are still coming. It is significant to note that our local Entrepreneurs were not left behind in the tourism development of our nation. They took advantage of the concessions that were offered and Cricket World Cup 2007 did fuel the expansion of small hotels and guest houses.

The Tourism product has been expanded and this process continues. Our Restaurants, Entertainment Centres, Recreation Facilities, Rain Forest Tours, Water Sports, etc. are among the best offerings in the region. Rural communities are getting involved in special events such as St. Lucia Jazz, our annual premier tourism entertainment event. The introduction of Casino Gaming is yet to become reality.

St. Lucia – Simply Beautiful! It is referred to as the Helen of the West Indies. Its rich cultural heritage coupled with our rich natural vegetation continue to lure investors and tourists to our island. We have weathered the storm and kept our course hence the reason our economy has shown some degree of resilience. In business we hear the term LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION!!!! St. Lucia is ideally located. So, we have the location. What is needed now is PROMOTION, PROMOTION, PROMOTION!!!!

St. Lucia has a World Heritage Site – The Pitons and has been recommended by Oprah Winfrey as one of the top five places to visit in the world. Given such high accolade and recognition, we should be encouraged to push ahead and once again realize the kind of growth as was evidenced in 2006/2007 period. In going forward, we must create a greater sense of pride in our people for our national assets. At all ports of entry and around the island, towering posters of the Pitons should be mounted. A visit to the Pitons should be the one activity of every tourist visiting St. Lucia.

The Tourism sector has a serious challenge on its hands to ensure airlifts into St. Lucia. With a growing stock of rooms and declining air service, urgent attention is needed to attract airlines even in these difficult economic times when routes are being rationalized.

#### **MANUFACTURING:**

Our manufacturing sector though its experienced contraction in the 90s, has been expanding in recent years. This is as a direct result of Government's assistance to the sector supported by local, regional and international agencies offering technical support. The Technical Officers in the Ministry of Trade, Industry, Commerce & Consumer Affairs and the Office of Private Sector Relations, OPSR through a programme of assistance from the European Union have been of immense help to manufacturers. At the regional level, Caribbean Export based in Barbados, OECS – Export Development Unit in Dominica and several international Agencies contributed to the development of this sector.

Our manufacturers have availed themselves to international standards of certification to enable them to compete effectively in the global market place. Today, St. Lucia boasts of having World Class Manufacturers with ISO 9000 and other Industry Certification. The sector is supported by a strong Association. The St. Lucia Manufacturers Association which is in its 7th year and it has made a difference in getting Government to enter into a partnership with manufacturers to ensure the expansion of the sector. The BUY LOCAL CAMPAIGN is one such area of collaboration. Government has moved to ensure that local manufacturers' products be purchased by all its agencies.

#### MICRO, SMALL & MEDIUM ENTERPRISES SECTOR (MSME):

It is generally accepted that this sector consists of 85% of all the businesses in the private sector.

#### TECHNICAL & PROFESSIONAL SERVICES:

There is a great demand for services in this category at the local level. However, in recent times, the export of services has been pursued with much success.

CONSTRUCTION SECTOR: The many construction sites are evidence of progress and hope for the economy. Building on the momentum since 2005, the construction sector continues to show signs of further expansion. Real estate upscale developments are springing up around us almost daily. This is testimony to the fact that St. Lucia is still an attractive destination for direct foreign investment.

#### **CHALLENGES:**

Challenges will always present themselves and if we are weak hearted, we will be diverted from our path to progress and prosperity. The statistics have revealed that from a growth rate of 4.9 percent in 2006, preliminary estimates indicate that real economic growth decelerated to 0.5 percent in 2007. However, tourism and construction came to the rescue. While we were savoring the successes of the years 2006 & 2007, we were suddenly interrupted by the rise in Oil Prices. From the moment the price reached US\$97.00 per barrel, the good times were over Countries throughout the region and the rest of the world are facing the effects of the phenomenal rise in fuel prices. The increases have admittedly caused its fair share of troubles for St. Lucia. The deteriorating external environment will continue to impact on the pace of activity in the domestic economy. High and rising world oil and commodity prices, particularly food prices, present some economic challenges and uncertainty. However, it is reasonable to suggest that this too shall pass.

#### THE WAY FORWARD:

As we seek to find sustainable solutions to our impending economic crisis it is time to take bold initiatives that are consistent with the direction of the world economy. There has been a lot of talk about knowledge-based economy, the strides of countries like Singapore and other Asian countries are constantly being alluded to. Apart from the visits made by our leaders to those countries, what have they taken away from them? While I continue to hear about Singapore, Ireland has come off the radar. But there are many excellent examples that we are yet to take note of. What are we waiting for?

It is disheartening to me that in the OECS, none of the States has taken the lead to establish a platform of Innovation & Technology with the establishment of a Ministry or a Secretariat which will become the driver for utilizing the creative skills of our young people and provide opportunity for diversifying the businesses/investments of Entrepreneurs. Our best chances to expand our economy are in the areas of Innovation, Technology, Research & Development, Real Estate, Technical & Professional Services and Financial Services.

Based on the economic trends that are currently evolving in St. Lucia, massive and immediate action will have to be taken to replace rhetoric with action. We should take cognizance of the challenges imposed by the current processes of globalization and the resulting marginalization of Small Island Developing States. The vulnerability of St. Lucia's economy must be taken into consideration and it is against this background that it is desirable that the Government provides strong leadership that embraces Good Governance, Transparency and Accountability with a strong bias towards providing an enabling environment for businesses. Let us show the investors of the world that St. Lucia is serious and ready to attract Investors to our shores, and that we are prepared to meet the challenges head on that are imposed upon us and not just be content with playing the blame game.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

As the old saying goes "The race is not only for the swift but for those who endure to the end. How we tackle our opportunities now will determine the pace of the recovery of the economy. We have to be proactive and not reactivate as we tend to be. The turbulence in the banana industry is truly a wakeup call. A contingency (back up) plan should always be in place. We must never be overly dependent upon any single industry. Let us move away from heavy dependency in one area and concentrate on diversifying our economic base.

We are indeed a fortunate nation in many aspects. We are in a better position than most of our sister islands. Investors from all around the world are desperate for a piece of the action. Giving up is not an option. The good performance of the economy will have many benefits and we should all be excited about the prospects.

We have survived where others have crumbled. We have shown courage when others were afraid, we have opened our doors when others were closed, we have shown our strengths and we should not fail to capitalize on them. We have found niches in the past; we can do so again.

The CSR National Workshop was a resounding success and the task now at hand is for those who received the training to pass it on to businesspersons in their communities. Workshops are already being discussed for Soufriere and Vieux Fort. Local Trainers are Yvonne Agard, Martin Satney and Edward Harris. A National Steering Committee was established. The following persons volunteered: Cornie Marius, Shaun Cypal, Elizabeth Rose, Bernez Khodra, Hannah Forde, and Cheryl Skeete. The three Trainers will also serve on the committee.
